

**President's Report:** The President summarised key points from his report as published in the revised version of the Annual Report.

**Treasurer's Report:** The Treasurer explained the \$14,000 loss was partly due to timing. The Bunnings grant of \$30,000 was received in last year's accounts but was spent in this year's accounts. There was the purchase of some capital items. Both chillers have been upgraded after thirty years and a new fridge is in the kitchen. The Irish Test helped the bar takings increase and thanks was given to Jim and James Columb for their organisation of this.

Geoff Simons asked why accounts do not show a true picture of Financial Performance for one year. Why should money received in advance not be included in the financial report for the following year. The Treasurer replied this is the way they have been asked to be produced by the Incorporated Societies.

Geoff Simons also mentioned the publication of the 150<sup>th</sup> Anniversary book has not cost the club and if enough sales are made there may be a profit.

An email from Life Member, Adrian Read was read out highlighting that he believed too much was given to players for not enough in return. The lack of subs collected was a concern. Jim Columb thought this was a bit simplistic although he did not disagree with it. It was difficult to get a true comparison of subs as some teams had a very short season and paid less. Geoff Simons urged that players were informed early of their obligations to pay a sub and if the full amount could not be paid by the end of May, then surely \$50 could be paid by the end of April. If no, the player probably had no intention of paying.

#### **General Business:**

**150**<sup>th</sup> **Anniversary:** Jim Columb summarised the organisation for this event. The database was being added to. The 10<sup>th</sup> December was when draft details would be emailed out. Then a social media campaign would begin. Paul Allison had agreed to be MC and had also contributed ideas to make the weekend successful. One set of playing jerseys to be auctioned as both genders can bid for these. It is hoped Dr Farah Palmer would be the guest speaker, but this has not been confirmed yet.

The Irish Test had been a checking of systems to see what worked and did not work. Leah from Encore Events would be the Event Manager. It was hoped we all could enjoy the event and not have to be concerned about having to undertake tasks during the event.

The cost would be \$250 a head with a final decision on the cost for players being made later. Players would not be at the Friday night function. This is a break even amount and the bar will be profit. Probably three items of merchandise will be available to purchase. Bill Milne is checking out the price of bracelets loaded with money could speed up payments during the event.

Draft Programme: Registration packs will be available from 3pm on Friday with the bar opening at 5pm. Formal opening at 7pm. Rugby games on Saturday and a function at night. Continuous food both nights Barb and Sandi to supply food on the Sunday.

Jim is also keen to rebrand the Pinters' Club as there is a belief many more people will contribute to this if it is renamed and has a particular project to promote.

**AGM numbering:** Geoff Simons believes the AGM numbering system is incorrect. The first one was held in 1873 so 2023 should be the 151<sup>st</sup>. But two AGMs were held in 1976 so next year should be the 152<sup>nd</sup> AGM. This year's should be the 151<sup>st</sup>.

**Constitution:** Geoff Simons explained all incorporated societies need to update their constitutions in the next two years. We must include job descriptions of key positions and how disputes are resolved. NZ Rugby have suggested the ORFU should be the last place to appeal to. Jamie Leckie will send Geoff some samples produced by OUSA.

Geoff believes this is an opportunity to restructure the way we operate. For discussion with the incoming committee is a proposal to have an Executive with a Chair and eight Directors, who each are responsible for a sub-committee. The sub-committees would make decisions for the Executive to, in most cases, rubber stamp. We need to have more people involved in undertaking tasks and not have to attend meetings that do not interest them. We need to spread the workload.

**Hard Copies:** Jim asked that hard copies of the previous AGM minutes could be supplied at the next AGM. The secretary said this would be possible but someone else would need to produce the Annual Report next year.

Meeting closed at 8.27pm.

Chris Aitken continued with the Fillies for the second year.

Once again a champion tag was going to be missed. Two years earlier a final had been lost and last year as top qualifiers they had been tripped up in the semi-final against the same team they now faced. Only Paige Church remained from the team that had won previously in 2012.

of players play higher honours. We also had the biggest number of high school age players, playing premiership rugby, so this is pleasing for the years to come.



On the statistics ledger Taylor Anderson, Jamie Church, Carly Foy and captain Zoe Whatarau played in all ten games. Jamie Church scored ten tries and snuck over a conversion for 52 pts in total, while Tessa Brown achieved 46 pts, including two tries. The team used 35 players over the season. Eight players from the two women's teams played for the Otago Spirit and another eight for the Otago Development team.









#### **Fillies Development**

It was a tough season for the Fillies, with a mission statement of looking to go back-to-back in the Development grade. We fell short of our expectations, finishing third this year, with several of our 2022 players going up to the Premier Women's grade for this season. though still struggling for numbers being a development team for the Premier grade,


covering for their injuries was always required.

#### **Basis of Preparation**

Alhambra-Union Rugby Football Club Inc. ('the entity') has elected to apply PBE SFR-A (NFP) Public Benefit Entity Simple Format Reporting - Accrual (Not-For-Profit) on the basis that it does not have public accountability and has total annual expenses of equal to or less than \$2,000,000. The entity is not required to comply with Generally Accepted Accounting Principles, and therefore requirements of the framework relating to statement of service performance have not been applied. All transactions in the Performance Report are reported using the accrual basis of accounting. The Performance Report is prepared under the assumption that the entity will continue to operate in the foreseeable future.

#### **Income Tax**

Alhambra-Union Rugby Football Club Inc. is wholly exempt from New Zealand income tax having fully complied with all statutory conditions for these exemptions.

#### **Goods and Services Tax**

The entity is registered for goods and services tax ('GST'). All amounts are stated exclusive of GST except for accounts payable and accounts receivable which are stated inclusive of GST.

#### **Bank Accounts and Cash**

Bank accounts and cash in the Statement of Cash Flows comprise cash balances and bank balances (including short term deposits) with original maturities of 90 days or less.

#### Investments

Investments are carried at historical cost less impairment, if any.




# Alhambra-Union Junior Rugby Club Report 2023

#### Leadership

#### Registrations

The first thing we decided we needed was a Muster Day. We knew particularly that to field a Year 7/8 team this year we needed to bring new families into the club, so we set about putting that in place. Despite the poor weather on the day, we found this to be really successful seeing the number of children registered to our junior club go from 62 in 2022, to 94 in 2023. We would like to thank the senior club for their support with this, especailly Jona Nareki and Vilimoni Koroi. The bouncy castle and the ice cream truck were a hit! We hope that this will now become part of our build up to each season.



With the 94 players registered we were then able to set to making our teams. We had six teams in total, a Year 7/8 team (which also had year 6 players), a Year 5 team (which had some year 4 and 6 players), a Year 3 team, a Year 2 team, a Year 1 team and an Under 5 team; three tackle teams and three ripper. After being initially concerned about finding enough players for our Year 7/8 full field team, we ended up with 21 players in that squad, so we were pretty happy with that, and the depth across the teams. After a few weeks of the season, we had considered making a seventh team as some of our squads were quite large, but we were glad in the end that we did not as some teams would have been struggling for numbers as the season went on.

#### Coaches

We were extremely lucky with the depth and experience that we have with our junior coaches. Other than Bryce King, a premier player, they are all parents within the club and the majority have played for the club. They all ran weekly practices, communicated with families and upheld the mana of our club at all times. We hope they know how appreciative we were of the time and energy that they put into our season, and hopefully they will continue to follow their teams as they progress through the club.

#### **Uniforms**

Fitting this number of players into our uniforms was a little bit tricky. We did well with what we had, but it is certainly an area of concern and will need to be addressed if we continue to grow. The new uniforms that were recently purchased look really sharp, but they are quite small fitting, so that is something to be aware of if we are going to continue with that supplier.

#### Hoodies

We also did two runs of hoodies during the season through The Print Room. The cheapest that we could do them was for \$65 each, which is quite a cost for families, but we are pleased with the quality of these fleece hoodies, and they do seem to last for two to three seasons. It would be great to have a stock of these for the start of the season, if possible, so that families can purchase them straight away instead of having to wait for 4-6 weeks to get the order done.

#### **Fundraising**

We ran three major fundraisers throughout the season in an effort to try to cover our own costs, particularly for providing food at a reasonable cost for families at our Player of the Month events. We did the sausage sizzle at the 150th premier game (with the support of the senior club), we held a Quiz night and a disco. We made the following profit from those three events. Sausage sizzle: \$500, Quiz Night: \$1400 and Disco: \$609.

#### Fees

Obviously being fees free for the past few seasons has had a huge impact on the numbers in our club. We know that this is not going to be sustainable, but we are really keen to come up with ways that we can keep costs down to keep reducing barriers for children to play this awesome sport!

#### Player of the Month

This year we moved our Player of the Month celebrations to half-time of home games for our Premier team. We found this to be a huge success with families enjoying the earlier start and not having to come back out at nighttime. We will need to look at increasing the price for the food though, as the gold coin system that has been running for a number of years now is no longer covering costs. We are so grateful to Sandi Wheeler and Barb Gazeley for their ongoing support. They always go above and beyond to ensure that everyone is well fed, and nobody misses out.

#### Ball boys/girls

A number of our year 7/8 players were involved this year with being ball boys/girls for the home games at North Ground. This was a great experience for them, but also brought more families along to watch the games, and to cheer on our AU teams.

#### Taieri 7s






#### Year 1 Ponies: Tania and Andrew Matoto




#### Year 5 Brumbies: Jamie Leckie and Bryce King
