Room 8 and Mohaka are fortunate to have Aamin in our whanaukura. **Astamira fi aleamal alraayie!** Keep up the great work!



- Our combined effort from whānau and Te Kura Takawaenga o Ōtātara Taradale Intermediate has resulted in strong attendance (70% and above of the school attending 91-100% of the time). If 3 of the 57 Year 8 ākonga whose attendance rate is 81 90% attended 2 or more days we would have met our 2025 target of 70% of the kura attending above 90%.
- 230 ākonga (44% of our kura) currently have an attendance rate of 100% Congratulations!
- We have 62 ākonga whose attendance rate is 90%. If this cohort attended one of the days they
 missed school our overall attendance data would read 441 ākonga and 84% of our ākonga with an
 attendance rate of 91 100%. Everyday counts!
- We'd like to thank all parents for helping make this data look so healthy, without your support we wouldn't have had such a strong start to the year.

The Ministry of Education has set a target that by 2030 80% of all students will attend school regularly 90% of the time which impacts the chances of ākonga being successful in their learning.



* These approximate numbers of students are based on the numbers of students in the regular attendance categories in Term 2 2024.

MISSING UNIFORMS

LOCKDOWNS AND SHELTER IN PLACE PROCEDURES

All kura have a great many policies and procedures and, like most, we have robust reviews of these. One of the most important ones is one that we hope we never have to invoke but which we have no control over. The world has been a rapidly changing place and that has meant that there are events that now happen that thirty years ago would have been thought absurd.

There is a slight difference between a Lockdown (a direct threat to the school or within its environment) and a Shelter in Place (an indirect threat located nearby). Regardless of the wording or titles, the reality is that if we are informed that one of the two has to be put in place then that is what we will do! We are usually informed about such things by the Police and/Ministry of Education. And, regardless, our focus is on keeping all safe.

Should there ever be a need for either of these events to occur then please remember the following...

- we, the school, will contact all initial points of contact informing you of what is occurring. It is important that you know that our communications will be short and sharp but will also be very honest. You will know what we know!
- you, the whanau, sit tight and wait for further information from us. Our communications will be regular and to the point. We may be frustrated by a lack of communication from above but that won't prevent us from ensuring that you know that your tamariki are safe. Please do not contact us! We will probably need to keep all of our own lines of communication free.
- we will need to keep the tamariki away from their own devices. Experience tells us that access to social media in these situations heightens any already existing anxieties - this is usually through the spreading of incorrect information.
- once an all clear is given, we will then re-inform whanau. We then roster classes to the hall where we create a supervised release of all pupils, class by class, so that we can be certain that all are going home with the right people.


