and had started to make good progress in this role. Regrettably serious family illness meant her stay with Metro was cut short. Together, the staff run an efficient organisation. It hosts the annual golf tournament, the AGM, end of season prize giving, and promotes opportunities for clubs and advisory groups to offer feedback on the state and direction of the community game.

CHAIRMAN'S Report



Kia ora koutou

It is, once again, a real honour to lead the Board of Christchurch Metropolitan Cricket Association (CMCA) and to present the Annual Report for the 2022/2023 season.

It was an exciting season of adult and youth community cricket here in Christchurch with most of our competitive grades being decided late on the final day of an exciting season. The overall satisfaction of those playing community cricket in Christchurch is very high as we have seen from our own survey and the annual NZC Voice of Participant research.

In the background to a successful season the organisation has had a busy and challenging time in discussions with Canterbury Cricket about the Cricket in Christchurch Review as well as their decision to change the funding and delivery model affecting all the District Associations.

Last year CMCA shared our Strategic Plan looking to connect our community through the game of cricket and supporting participation in the game. We have seen the value in providing and participating in community cricket to bring people together for fun, healthy competition and fostering good relationships and community spirit.

Our focus over the next four years is centred around these three areas of strategic intent:

- Ensure member clubs and schools are strong and sustainable, providing high quality cricket experiences for the people of Christchurch.
- Provide leadership and advocate for the best outcomes for cricket in Christchurch, working in partnership with our cricket community to grow the sport.
- Drive participation through innovation, providing multiple pathways to attract, grow and retain participants, so more people can access and enjoy our great game.

Our Board is committed to that strategic direction. I will also outline some of the discussions and developments that are taking place with our stakeholders.

Our competitions

It was fantastic to come together again at the Christchurch Golf Club in April to celebrate successful individual and team performances at our Annual Awards night. This was not possible last year and so we had excellent attendance, and it was great to come together and acknowledge performance and achievement from a wonderful season.

Congratulations to Old Boys Collegians Cricket Club as the winners of the prestigious Petersen Shield as the top performing club across all CMCA competitions in 2022/23. Not surprisingly they featured in several of the highly competitive finals in our top grades.

In our Premier Women's competitions, Sydenham beat Lancaster Park in the EV Power Premier T20 final however Lancaster Park turned the tables to beat Sydenham in the EV Power Premier One Day final. Lancaster Park Premier Women have won 7 of the last 8 Premier One Day titles. At the conclusion of the season Sydenham secured the EV Power Four 20 Fizz competition.

Burnside West University were the winners of the OEM Audio Premier Two Day competition on the last day of the season with Heathcote and St Albans also in the hunt for the title late on that final day. Tim Murdoch was at Burnside Park but with the engine running, unsure whether he was handing the spoils out there or needing to get across town to the Valley. This was a great advertisement for our OEM Audio Premier competition, with Burnside West University coming out on top.

Old Boys Collegians were the champions in our white ball formats winning the OEM Audio Premier T20 and One Day competitions in finals against Sydenham and Burnside West University respectively.

Old Boys Collegians were victorious in the Championship T20 final beating Sydenham. However, the highlight in the Championship competition was Merivale Papanui who beat Old Boys Collegians in the One Day final. Merivale Papanui has earned promotion to the OEM Audio Premiership next season as a result of their excellent all round season.

The ARA All Nations Festival was another outstanding success with another record number of entries. The Festival is the result of CMCA partnering with the Christchurch Multicultural Council and we value that relationship, and the festival is a great showcase of the diversity that exists in our Christchurch cricket community.

CMCA is pleased with the growth of participation in grades like Cavaliers and Presidents and once again our Robbie's Riccarton Twilight Cricket has proven a popular weeknight business house league format.

CMCA surveyed our participants in our top four grades with a view to getting some feedback and insights from

those playing in these competitions. We had a fantastic response with over 180 survey returns from players. The big takeout was a high level of satisfaction with the current competitions but there were some good insights on refinements and suggestions for the future. Thank you to all those that took the time to participate in that survey.

Financial performance

CMCA's budget for 2022/2023 reflected an expected reduction in available funding largely on the back of advice regarding the impacts of the pandemic on gaming trust funding. The Board was also highly committed to the establishment of a Female Cricket Participation Manager role to focus on the development of female cricket in our local competitions through schools and clubs.

Having budgeted for a deficit of \$50K, the year end result of a \$20K deficit was a very pleasing achievement. During the third quarter the Board chose to make funds available to clubs for specific projects that would benefit participation and many clubs applied successfully to access these funds.

The Board acknowledging the financial challenges at grassroots cricket, chose despite the challenging fiscal position to make additional funds available to clubs. Clubs applied to the Board outlining their specific project and it was pleasing to hear from most clubs.

The Board has agreed to hold reserves of around \$200k to mitigate risk of future fiscal challenges and to be able to continue to meet our financial obligations should there be an unexpected change in revenues or funding availability.

In addition, CMCA has hosted some financial workshops for clubs, facilitated by Kerry Dellaca of Game Plan, to share some of the challenges and good practices in both managing costs and revenues for local clubs. It is no surprise to learn many of the expense challenges are common. The willingness to share information, ideas and collaborate in administration while playing to win on the field has been outstanding from our club leadership.

The Board continues to operate a Finance, Risk and Assurance Committee led by Fergus Smith and it has worked closely with the GM in reviewing risks including our financial position, forecasting and investment options for the Board to consider.

CMCA is pleased to have had the support of the following key financial partners: New Zealand Cricket, Canterbury Cricket and many charitable organisations including Air Rescue Community Services, Mainland Foundation, Rata Foundation, Pub Charity, Aotearoa Gaming Trust, Lion Foundation, New Zealand Community Trust, Kiwi Gaming Foundation and TAB Gaming.

A special thanks to Paul O'Connor and OEM Audio/ EV Power and your sponsor partnership for our Premier Men's and Women's competitions this year and we acknowledge your continued support during the season. Thanks also to Robbie's Riccarton our Twilight Competition sponsor who make such a valuable contribution to our community game.

Special thanks to Ara/Te Pukenga for their sponsorship of our Youth 1st XI cricket and the Community Partnership Scholarship. Our thanks also to Kookaburra, Cricket Express, The Christchurch Golf Club, The Lone Star and Joe's Garage and Two Fat Indians Restaurant.

We were pleased to be able to specifically recognise our volunteers, performances of the week and FairPlay awards through the support of our sponsors.

Looking to the future

During the season CMCA participated in the Cricket in Christchurch Review, a project driven by Canterbury Cricket and facilitated by Sport Canterbury involving ourselves, Christchurch Junior Cricket Association and Canterbury Cricket. The final recommendations and CMCA's feedback regarding these have been shared with our member clubs.

A firm priority for CCA, supported by NZ Cricket as I understand, has been the drive towards a single governance model in Christchurch community cricket and a desire to have one governance entity. One organisation governing community cricket in Christchurch from juniors to veterans may well be a positive step change.

However, it must be agreed as the intent of all parties and the benefits clearly understood if we are to invest further energies. To be clear, CMCA is not the driver seeking one entity for community cricket in Christchurch. Our Board are open minded and will continue those discussions in good faith with CCA and CJCA and with the interests of community cricket in Christchurch at our core.

Alongside these discussions Canterbury Cricket has made changes for the funding and delivery model for community cricket with its District Associations for the coming year. CCA is investing in a shared service delivery model of Game Development Officers employed by them with a focus on growing participation and game development with clubs and schools across all the Canterbury Districts.

While the total funds being invested in community cricket have increased overall, the direct cash funding grants being made to the Districts has reduced by over \$180k. In addition, CMCA and CJCA are now funded as a single allocation. I would like to acknowledge Lynette Ellis, incoming CJCA Chairperson for the constructive way we have worked that through together for the season ahead.

For both organisations that meant a collective reduction in cash grants from \$239k to \$154k a reduction of \$85k. CCA have committed additional resources by employing 2.5 Game Development Officers for Christchurch and a further 3.0 full and part time GDO's across Canterbury Country, Mid and South Canterbury and Buller/West Coast.

The District Association Chairs also worked together successfully to review and agree the approach to the DA funding allocation model to account for reduced cash grants and the introduction of the Game Development Officers.

I would also like to acknowledge my fellow DA Chairs for the commitment and constructive teamwork in working through the challenges these changes presented. A positive outcome from the time and energy involved has been a galvanised and united DA leadership group. My thanks to Hugh Wright (Canterbury Country), Lynette Ellis (CJCA), Jono Pavey (Mid-Canterbury), Bec Brookland (South Canterbury), Kevin Scanlon (Buller) and Brendan Marshall (West Coast) for their support and collaboration.

A positive outcome of all these discussions is a constructive working relationship with the CCA Board. I would like to acknowledge Jono Brent, new CCA Chairperson, for the way he has worked with the DAs' in navigating these changes.

Wider Christchurch cricket community

CMCA acknowledges the addition of the Sir Richard Hadlee Sports Centre to the Hagley Cricket Precinct which will benefit both club and elite cricketers. This outstanding facility was a welcome addition for pre-season and in season training.

The Board is also mindful that a number of clubs have their own capital projects, in many cases worth hundreds of thousands of dollars with aspirations to improve the cricket experience for their local communities.

The recent indoor training facilities opened by Sydenham Cricket Club are another example of these and our congratulations to the club in achieving a fantastic outcome.

The CMCA Board are committed to getting alongside and supporting clubs to achieve their goals and provide the best possible environment, facilities and support for people to take part in community cricket. We appreciated and valued hearing from clubs in a variety of ways throughout the season.

Christchurch Metro management

Congratulations to CMCA management for another successful year in the delivery of our community cricket in the Christchurch Metropolitan area. We are a small organisation, but our highly skilled and experienced team do a fantastic job. This year represented something of a transition with a couple of new faces joining the team.

Mike Harvey, as General Manager, has again led Metro very well across all aspects of the organisation from the quality of our competitions, facilities, development programmes and financial management. Mike works collaboratively across the wider cricket community especially with Canterbury Cricket, Canterbury Country and CJCA. Mike has done an excellent job working with the Board and we are delighted with Mike's leadership of the organisation and the strong relationships he has with stakeholders.

Tim Murdoch took over as our Operations Manager this season and brings a wealth of cricket operations experience from previous roles with NZ Cricket and more recently Nelson Cricket. He is also well known and has strong networks and credibility in the Christchurch cricket community. Tim is bringing his own perspective and leadership to the future planning and approach for our competitions. His communication and organisation skills have been to the fore and our thanks to Tim for the great start he has made in his first year in the role.

Keryn Ambler continues to drive our schools' and youth cricket development initiatives. They are a key cornerstone of the community game in Christchurch and an important part of our Strategic Plan. Keryn continues to do splendid work in coach education and growth in the participation levels in the youth game which have again been recognised in our performance indicators with Canterbury Cricket.

Keryn has built on the excellent work of earlier seasons and has established a strong reputation and credibility in the Canterbury region for his development work. A particular focus this season has been trialling changes to improve the experience and retention of Year 9 cricketers which has received positive feedback.

Keeping youth engaged in cricket, transition of youth cricketers and retaining youth in cricket beyond high school continues to be a significant challenge in our game. This will continue to be a focus for CMCA.

We welcomed Katie Blunsdon to Metro as our Women's & Girls Activation Co-Ordinator during the year. Katie brought an energy and passion for women and girls' cricket which added to the diversity and capability to the Metro team. Unfortunately, Katie had to return to her family in the Waikato for personal reasons. We were sad to lose her and thank Katie for all she contributed and achieved.

The organisation of the delivery of all our competitions and those on behalf of CJCA is a well-oiled system which we must never take for granted. A strength for Metro is the engagement with those playing and administering the game to consider innovative ways to get people involved, offer different types of cricket formats and to look to the future.

Regular engagement with club chairs, grade captains, school co-ordinators, Youth and Women's Advisory Groups is an important part of how CMCA management works with our stakeholders. These forums continue to play a vital role in ensuring two-way communication and strong relationships exist to discuss issues, test thinking and that the competition and experiences offered are meeting the needs of participants.

Your Christchurch Metro Board

My thanks to the Board for their continued commitment, time and effort and the skills and experience you bring to the Board table. This has been a particularly challenging year and has needed a significant commitment of time and energy especially in the Cricket in Christchurch Review, governance, CCA delivery model and DA funding allocation changes. The stability of Board membership, skills, capability and grassroots cricket knowledge has been crucial.

This is a voluntary role and, like so many others in our sport, it is the commitment of volunteers like yourselves that enables the organisation to be successful through good governance, strategic direction and strong working relationships with management and the wider cricket community.

During the season we celebrated Board member Lesley Murdoch's appointment as the new President of New Zealand Cricket. This was a great acknowledgement of Lesley's involvement, contribution and mana within our sport.

Together with Krish Macgregor, Kirsty Bond, Fergus Smith, Aaron Johnstone and Luke Hayward we have a good mix of skills and experience and the CMCA Board is in good shape to meet the challenges ahead. All have some involvement in grassroots club cricket and are committed to a strong and successful community game here in Christchurch.

I'd like to acknowledge Heather Steele for her contribution in her second year as our President. Heather is continuing the tradition of a highly engaged and committed President who contributes to the governance and direction of the organisation.

Special mention to Krish Macgregor who is stepping down from the Board at the upcoming AGM. Krish has been a strong contributor and much respected member of the Board during her tenure. She has managed to fit this commitment in around family, running a successful business, supporting school cricket and organising the boys at Richmond WMC cricket. There has been no fiercer advocate for club and school cricket than Krish and we thank her for her service and contribution over many years.

Conclusion

Christchurch Metro has once again achieved our key performance indicators under the NZC partnership model administered by Canterbury Cricket. Management have worked hard to ensure a successful outcome and to maximise available funding through strong organisational performance.

Participants playing community cricket in Christchurch and Canterbury are once again the most satisfied of those taking part anywhere in New Zealand from the recent Voice of the Participant survey. This is a strong and important base to build on in terms of growth and participation for the future.

There will undoubtedly be some challenges and opportunities given the discussions with Canterbury Cricket regarding the desire to have one entity for the governance of community cricket in Christchurch.

Together with the changes to District Association funding and the CCA delivery model there will be some difficult choices for the organisation in the next few years. The CMCA Board will continue to have an open mind about what is the best construct for community cricket in Christchurch.

We have successfully built a strong, capable organisation with an excellent track record since bringing together the Christchurch Suburban Cricket Association and CCA's Christchurch clubs over ten years ago. Being involved at that time, this was achieved through a start point of mutual agreement.

The organisation has set a clear strategic direction for the next four years built around the vision of connecting our community through the game of cricket. Our financial stability, management capability, good governance and strong relationship with members and stakeholders together with a strong record of the past ten years supports this.

CMCA will continue to focus on sound financial management, be clear about our priorities, listen and engage with members to help ensure our competitions and approach is meeting the future needs of our community. Maintaining good working relationships and engagement with our members, stakeholders and wider community must not be compromised.

We cannot stand still and need to change and adapt to the environment and opportunities around us. Being relevant and accessible is important for all our membership network and we will continue to work with you on how we take Christchurch Metro cricket forward.

Thanks to all those who have worked hard to make cricket happen and provide the best possible experience for those playing community cricket. Your time and energy are much appreciated by all those that enjoy cricket in Christchurch.

I look forward to working with all those involved in our game to ensure community cricket in Christchurch and more broadly across the Canterbury region, continues to be an outstanding example of good governance and cricket delivery in New Zealand.

GENERAL MANAGER'S Report



As preparations began for the 2022-23 season, we were thankful that we had put the worst of the Covid pandemic behind us and that day-to-day life had returned to normal. We were still however acutely aware that the virus was still very much in the community and unsure of if there would be any lingering impacts on the cricket season. Thankfully there were no widespread disruptions to play as there had been in the previous season.

A major change for this season was the adoption on PlayHQ for Christchurch Metro Cricket, clubs and schools. The change from CricHQ was made with some trepidation and there were certainly many challenges faced with the new systems adoption.

We thank the users of PlayHQ for their patience and the time they have taken post season to feed back required enhancements to NZ Cricket, with many of those already undertaken as we expect the system to improve year on year.

The weather played its part, and although conditions were often cool in the early part of the season, at least most Saturdays were dry and it was not until the second half of the season where play was disrupted in a major way.

Some wet weather mid-week made life difficult for clubs and the Christchurch City Council ground staff. Covers were often sighted on pitches mid-week and grass kept on growing all summer, ensuring a busy season on the mowers.

Plaudits must go to the Christchurch City Council for continuing to show the vision and leadership on the grounds and facilities in the city.

The Sir Richard Hadlee Sports Centre Development was completed and has made a massive impact on the training opportunities for community cricketers. The new Jim Wakefield Pavilion was officially opened at Elmwood Park and in use for the first time, a huge asset for Old Boys Collegians and others who get to use it. The third phase of the Elmwood project is the pitch and outfield work, which is now in full swing and should be complete by January 2024.

Lancaster Park has been a welcome addition to the community cricket grounds network and will only improve further as the storage facility and community hub are added to the park. We await the return of Premier cricket at that point.

Riccarton are still in talks with the Christchurch City Council regarding the shared facility at Riccarton Domain with progress ongoing and the Sydenham Cricket Club have almost completed their new indoor centre, which will be a welcome addition to the Sydenham community.

Collaborating with the Christchurch City Council, the Christchurch clubs are privileged to possess a dedicated and well-informed team of groundskeepers responsible for maintaining the club pitches. It is with great pride that we claim Christchurch to boast some of the finest club grounds in New Zealand, as the quality and abundance of our lush grass surfaces are a source of envy for other associations.

Huge thanks to the Board of the CMCA who set the policies, provide sound governance and monitor finances for the Association. We have an experienced and knowledgeable group who have community cricket at heart, and always make decisions in the best interests of the game. Bruce Findlay (Chair), Kirsty Bond, Lesley Murdoch, Luke Hayward, Krish Macgregor, Fergus Smith and Aaron Johnstone are those to thank for making the commitment to be on the Board.

Heather Steele joins the group for most meetings in her capacity as President and her experience within community cricket enables her to also make a valuable contribution.

Thanks to CCA Community Manager Simon Hill for his dedication and leadership within the Community game and his team, in particular Rebecca Gillette and Richard Pithey, for their tireless commitment in promoting cricket to the wider community through their programmes.

We continue to link closely with Christchurch Junior Cricket and I thank General Manager Rob Wilkinson and Chair Lynette Ellis for their commitment to this collaboration. This relationship enables us all to deliver high level services to stakeholders. Lynette has come into the CJCA Chair's role at a time when there is much happening and she has quickly started to come to grips with the complexities of community cricket.

Thanks to Kent Stead and the Community Team at New Zealand Cricket for their leadership. With the increasing need for compliance in various areas at a local level, CMCA appreciates the support of NZC with advice and templates that enable clubs and schools to focus on game delivery.

Sincere thanks to Tim Murdoch, who has come into the role of Operations Manager, vacated by Mike Fisher on his retirement. Tim has taken the time to build relationships with club and school volunteers and to assess the many different playing conditions and rules that govern the game. He has been a visible presence around the grounds each Saturday, which has helped build the relationships with stakeholders.

Keryn Ambler leads the Development programmes for youth cricket and manages to support that is provided to volunteer coaches and junior clubs and secondary schools. This is no easy task with over 450 coaches registered within Christchurch. Keryn also heads up the organisation of the CMCA Festival teams and does a fantastic job in co-ordinating all the teams, coaches, travel arrangements and equipment to ensure participants have a fantastic experience.

At the start of the season we welcomed Katie Blunsdon into the role of Women's Participation. Katie made the move south from Hamilton to join the CMCA and quickly went about providing opportunities for young females to engage in cricket programmes such as Girl's Smash, Yeah! Girls and at Secondary Schools. Thanks to Rebecca Gillette from the CCA for supporting Katie's induction and development. Due to a change in personal circumstances Katie returned to the North Island at the end of the season and we thank her for her significant contribution while she was here.

Rob Wilkinson continues to lead the Junior space and thanks to close cooperation between the CMCA and Christchurch Junior Cricket, we are able to ensure smooth running of all parts of the game.

Clubs

We are immensely grateful to our exceptional volunteers who diligently lead and oversee the operations of our clubs, ensuring a high standard. It is through their dedicated efforts in the fields of Christchurch that the growth and progress of cricket players, coaches, and volunteers are made possible. Their groundwork forms the foundation for the development and advancement of all involved in the sport.

Our clubs consistently aim for progress, as evidenced in this report, through the tremendous dedication invested in facility development over the past few seasons.

We express our gratitude for the unwavering commitment of the clubs towards the partnership agreements established to aid the CMCA in achieving our Key Performance Indicators (KPIs) with the CCA and NZC. This collaborative effort ensures that the community game adheres to crucial compliance matters, including Health and Safety protocols, Police Vetting, Coach Development, and PLayHQ implementation. By having these measures firmly in place, the smooth operation of on-field activities is facilitated.

In the EV Power Premier Women's Competition, Sydenham claimed two of the three available trophies, highlighting the development of the team over the last few seasons, while Lancaster Park reclaimed the one-day title after losing it to Old Boys Collegians last year.

Old Boys Collegians were the dominant force in the OEM Audio Premiership taking both white ball trophies, with Burnside West prevailing in the two-day competition.

Youth cricket

The results of youth cricket are highlighted in other sections of the report and well done to all winners. Huge thanks to the Ara Institute of Canterbury/ Te Pukenga, for their support of the 1st XI grades and to Cricket Express for supporting the Year 9-10 competitions.

We welcomed a number of new Canterbury Country and Mid Canterbury schools into the fold this season, with the aim of enabling the teams to fit into a grade that was commensurate with their ability. The teams performed with merit and we look forward to the ongoing involvement.

Schools play a significant role in community sport by providing a platform for young individuals to engage in sports activities. They serve as crucial hubs for fostering physical fitness, skill development, teamwork, and sportsmanship among students. The facilities they provide for training and playing and investment into coaching mean that they play a critical and much valued role in the cricket network.

Volunteers

The vibrant cricket community in Christchurch relies heavily on the invaluable contributions of numerous dedicated and enthusiastic volunteers within clubs and schools. Their immense dedication and passion are integral to the smooth functioning of cricket activities.

Consequently, the task of selecting recipients for our weekly and annual Volunteer Award Recognition becomes quite challenging for the judging panel, given the abundance of deserving individuals who selflessly contribute their time and efforts.

Club and Youth OPERATIONS REPORT



The 2022/23 season saw playing numbers and participating teams increase from the previous season. 138 teams participated in the adult competitions including a new grade for teams who had previously played Division 7 which comprised 8 teams from Canterbury Country and 8 Christchurch teams. This proved to a very successful amalgamation with all teams enjoying playing at new venues and the warm hospitality provided by all teams.

The weather was kinder this season with only two playing days lost albeit the first three months of the season was played in cooler, windy conditions. What did overshadow most of the season was the introduction and assimilation of the new scoring system Play HQ which New Zealand Cricket had determined should replace CricHQ. There were numerous difficulties (administrative, operational and technical) throughout the season which meant the club volunteers and CMCA staff were in constant communication addressing and solving problems which were time consuming and frustrating.

Grounds and facilities

CMCA would like to acknowledge and thank the various club grounds personnel play in providing good quality playing surfaces throughout the season. It is a thankless task but without this significant contribution we would not be able to provide the number of grass wickets we do all through the season. Congratulations to Jaymie Batchelor and Josh Morgan from Readylawn who were awarded the Club Groundsmen of the Year for their work at Riccarton Domain.

We enjoy a very positive working relationship with the Christchurch City Council through John Furlong our Sports Activation Advisor and Angela Leatherby as Sports Liaison Advisor. John is our day-by-day contact for ground and facility issues and provides the link to the ground's contractor Rec Services. We are extremely well served by John and Angela.

Ash Head and his Hagley Oval staff, particularly Andrew Quinn, have an enormous workload which includes the preparation, maintenance and repair of the club

cricket wickets at Hagley. We are very fortunate to have this resource made available for the benefit of club cricket. Thank you, Ash and Andrew.

We thank Chris Lewis for the turf management advice he provides to CMCA and its constituent clubs.

The adult game

The light was fading, the shadows growing at Burnside Park and spectators excitedly surrounded the field as the OEM Audio Premier 2-day competition came to an exciting conclusion on the last playing day of the season. Burnside West and Lancaster Park were fighting tooth and nail for final competition points. The ebb and flow of the game was enthralling as spectators and players lived every moment. Across town at Heathcote, there were similar scenes as the home team and St Albans were also engaged in a tense battle. Various match scenarios were being contemplated ball by ball, over by over and the prospect of a very fast trip across town to present the trophy was becoming a possibility. Eventually Burnside West prevailed over Lancaster Park and were deserved winners of the OEM Audio 2-day competition.

Burnside West were the dominant team in the round robin phase of OEM Audio 50 over competition winning all their round robin matches. Sydenham also enjoyed a successful round robin phase, and these two teams were the top qualifiers. As history tells you this does not guarantee final success. Old Boys Collegians won a very close semi-final match against Sydenham while Burnside West similarly were run close by Heathcote. The Final was highlighted by a magnificent unbeaten century from Jack Lewis which resulted in a comfortable win to Old Boys Collegians with four wickets and nearly five overs to spare.

Old Boys Collegians and Sydenham were the top qualifiers in the OEM Audio Twenty20 competition and faced off in the Final just before Christmas. OBC fielded a very powerful competitive team and were too strong for the gallant Sydenham team, winning by 7 wickets.

Congratulations to the Merivale Papanui Club for their promotion to the OEM Audio Premier Grade for the

2023/24 season. Their Championship team finished second in the 2-day competition, won the One Day competition and were mid table in the T20 competition which collectively gave them a comfortable cushion on the overall points table to earn promotion at the expense of Riccarton.

The EV Power Premier Women's Competition Finals were both contested by Lancaster Park and Sydenham, and both captured one title each. Both matches resulted in comprehensive victories for the winning team. Sydenham won the EV Power Twenty20 Final by 9 wickets while Park, in a low scoring match, won the EV Power One Day trophy by 71 runs. Sydenham capped off a very successful season winning the EV Power Four 20 Fizz competition.

Old Boys Collegians enjoyed a very successful season being awarded eight trophies for their overall club performances throughout the season. In addition to the two Premier grade titles, grades were also won by their Div.6, Div.4, Div.2 2-day, Championship T20 teams, the Walter Hadlee Trophy and the prestigious Peterson Shield for overall club team performances over the season. Congratulation to the club for this outstanding achievement.



Christs College won the Nationals Finals of the Gillette Cup in December capping off a memorable 2022 for the 1st XI. One of the highlights of their win was a huge second wicket stand of 276 between Tim Seeto and Nick Gibb against Mount Albert Grammar.

A new T20 competition was introduced in Term 1 2023 with 8 teams entered. Unfortunately, bad weather prevented a Final being played and the trophy was shared between the Christchurch Boys High School First and Second XI teams.

DEVELOPMENTReport



Introduction

During the past season, we experienced a more settled period without vaccine complications and overall better weather. This allowed us to focus on implementing new projects and initiatives. These aimed at enhancing the cricketing experience for our community in areas like festivals and coach development. In addition to these initiatives, it was pleasing to see cricket remained as popular as ever, with continued participation and enthusiasm from players of all ages and skill levels. This demonstrated the enduring appeal and strong following that cricket enjoys in Christchurch.

The collaboration between CMCA and the CJCA holds immense significance in our efforts to implement a range of junior initiatives across Christchurch. The clubs within our network play a vital role in the successful execution of these initiatives. We provide support to the clubs, enabling them to deliver exceptional programs within their respective communities. These programs are instrumental in fostering the growth of cricket in the community, and we deeply value the dedication and passion exhibited by the clubs in delivering high-quality sessions to our young players. Their commitment is pivotal in nurturing the next generation of cricket enthusiasts.

Festivals and tournaments

Within the Year 9/10 boys age group, Canterbury Country and Metro Cricket committed to a pilot programme which saw players groups based on their maturation age, rather than skill-based selection. Bio-Banding enables participants to be challenged in different roles and develop their skills by virtue of playing with peers of similar physical maturity. We hosted two festivals catering for both 'earlier muturers' and 'later maturers'. The ten CMCA/CCCA teams were split across two festivals. The players played three days of cricket and it was fascinating to see the different styles of cricket across the two festivals.

The Year 9/10 girls' festival was played in Timaru with two Metro teams involved. Despite the weather washing out three of the six rounds, the girls had a great time. The coaches did a fantastic job creating fun activities and challenges for the girls to engage in when

the rain was falling. When on the field, the Metro Red side went through the festival unbeaten.

The Year 11/12 boys' festival was played in stunning weather in Canterbury Country and the competition reflected this with it being a tightly challenged competition. Metro Cricket had four teams who all had competitive festivals. It was pleasing to see different players in each team contribute to strong performances each day. Chris Ellison had a strong finish to the festival scoring back-to-back 50's on day three and four. Christchurch Whero was the pick of the teams, finishing unbeaten.

For the Year 11-13 girls' festival, our Metro team travelled down Oamaru and joined three teams from Otago. Although the Metro comfortably won each game, the festival created great opportunities for players to contribute in different roles.

Within the National school tournament space, and Christ's College continued their strong local form into the Gillette Cup nationals. Christ's had a dominant week, moving though the tournament unbeaten and winning the title for the first time. Christ's had a number of strong contributors with both bat and ball but Tim Seeto's performances stood out winning the player of the tournament award. Christchurch Girls' High School had a good week at the Gillette Venus Cup winning three from four matches. They had a tight match against Epsom Girls' on the final day which CGHS unfortunately lost by 3 runs to finish second. St Andrew's College qualified for the Junior Secondary School Boys finals winning three from five games. After losing to a strong Auckland Grammar side on day 3, second equal was the best they could finish, and did so with a sound finish to the week.

Initiatives

Each season, our primary aim is to assess and adapt our cricket programs to ensure they remain relevant and appealing to the youth. Recognizing that young individuals have diverse expectations for recreational activities, we strive to meet their needs. Our objective is to maintain a strong connection with young people and understand the various options available to fulfil their preferences, whether it be through traditional forms of the game or shorter, more social formats.

This season, we conducted a series of sessions in secondary schools. These student-led sessions primarily took place during lunch hours, adopting a 'play' based approach by providing equipment for students to engage in their own backyard cricket games. These visits served as a connection to create awareness about upcoming Backyard Cricket modules.

Katie Blunsdon, our Female Participation Manager developed the Yeah! Girls Smash festival on Thursday afternoons. The primary objective of this initiative is to enhance the presence and engagement of young female participants in secondary schools by offering them the chance to establish a connection between existing programs and additional exposure opportunities. By providing this softball format, it expanded their cricketing experience in an inclusive game. These teams were an ideal fit for the Forward Foundation festival which was postponed to October.

Coach education

Our primary objective in the coach development space is to ensure that all young cricketers have access to a safe and high-quality cricket environment. To achieve this, we prioritize certain measures early in the season, such as focusing on police vetting and completing online Vulnerable Persons modules to ensure the safety of all involved. Additionally, we offer a range of courses through the New Zealand Cricket coaching pathway, catering to coaches at various levels, and we are pleased with the strong participation in these courses.

In addition to these formalized courses, our club-based Coach Developers have been instrumental in providing exceptional support to coaches through in-field observations. This personalized support allows us to address specific needs and challenges that coaches may encounter while coaching.

This season we ran two pilot programmes, the first supporting secondary school student coaches and the other specifically targeting Halswell Junior coaches. Jimmy Sinclair played the coach developer role, using his skills to support coaches and identify specific areas of development. From his interactions with the coaches, he designed support sessions topics such as growth mindset, fielding games, and creating positive learning environments. The response from coaches has been outstanding, and we are grateful for their commitment to the development of young cricketers.

We extend our appreciation to the club-based Coach Developers for their exceptional support and guidance provided to junior coaches throughout the season. Furthermore, we would like to express our immense gratitude to all the coaches who participated in our coach development opportunities, generously dedicating their time to upskill themselves and for their tireless efforts in coaching throughout the season.

The Christchurch Junior Cricket Association deserves special recognition for their excellent job in advertising and promoting the coach development courses, their support has been invaluable throughout the season.

Conclusion

I would like to express my utmost appreciation for the invaluable contributions and support provided by Mainland Foundation to youth cricket in Christchurch. Their generous funding has been instrumental in supporting a number of important youth projects, making a significant impact on the development of cricket among the youth in our community. Their support is truly indispensable for the growth and success of youth cricket in Christchurch.

A special thanks goes to Simon Hill and the dedicated Activation team at Canterbury Cricket for their exceptional work throughout the season. Your unwavering support and efforts have been greatly appreciated, and they have added immense value to the cricketing experience for our young players. Your commitment to promoting and fostering the sport is commendable, and we are grateful for all that you have done.

Lastly, I would like to extend a heartfelt thank you to all the coaches, managers, administrators, and umpires who have tirelessly devoted their time and effort throughout the season. Your dedication and hard work are fundamental to the smooth functioning of our beloved game. Without your commitment, cricket would not flourish as it does. You create enjoyable and memorable experiences for countless players in Christchurch, and we sincerely appreciate your outstanding contributions. Please continue the remarkable work that you do. Christchurch JUNIOR CRICKET



The Christchurch Junior Cricket Association continued its role in deliver junior cricket to more than 2000 members via its 22 Clubs and Schools. Notably this includes two Country clubs whose involvement in the Girls competitions has swelled the numbers in these competitions to numbers not seen for many years.

The season just completed resulted in significant financial pressures with a number of contributing factors leading to a deficit that has meant the hardearned reserves of the Association have had to be called upon. The last few years which included Covid have been the 'rainy days' that these funds were specifically created to guard against as the Association aims to keep the general costs for participating in our sport as low as possible but still seek to provide a quality experience. The realities of the current financial environment mean that costs will need to be passed onto its participants but our membership should be aware that any increases are carefully considered before being implemented as we seek to operate as close to a break even budget as we can.

The Executive continues to be the grassroots sounding board through which we drive our strategic plan and we thank all the members of the Executive who have served. Special mention should be made of Mike Dunlop's contribution, despite his children being well past Junior Cricket, Mike's passion to ensure that the CJCA remit was continued led to an extended stint in the Executive as Chair since 2017 ending in October 2022. The role has been assumed by Lynette Ellis who leads an Executive which features an even balance of genders and a range of our Clubs represented.

Once again the Association had few issues to deal with in Clubland with the various clubs committees and volunteers providing our children with a positive playing environment to enjoy our game. The Association specifically wishes to thank the Clubs and Schools for their positive adoption of a new participation platform – PlayHQ – its is hoped that the off season leading into the 2023/24 season will provide an opportunity to iron our some of the issues that made this a challenging adoption in 2022/23 for many in our cricketing family.

The Association wishes to acknowledge all its funding partners including Canterbury and New Zealand Cricket, Rata Foundation, New Zealand Community

Trust, Aotearoa Gaming Trust and the Kiwi Gaming Foundation. We also greatly value the sponsorship of Cricket Express and Kookaburra as these all contribute to trying to keep our participation costs as low as possible. We would also like to acknowledge the significant contribution of ANZ through both their grants schemes for Clubs and Hardship grants which assist those for whom basic Club fees remain a challenge in the current economic environment.

Operational Summary

The CJCA Saturday competitions started the 2022/23 season with 222 teams which was a slight decline from the previous year.

As already mentioned the Girls competitions continue to rise after significant work in schools over the past 5-6 years. At the end of the season there were 25 teams in Girls only competitions which allowed for sectioning of grades to provide as many like-vs-like games to be scheduled. Outside this there was a rise in the number of Girls only teams in mixed grades below Year 5 and a significant number of girls in mixed teams. There is a planned expansion of the Girls only grades to hopefully start the Girls only playing pathway earlier than year 5 in 2023/24.

CJCA Spring and Summer Festivals continue to be a vital part of our Player Development Pathway as do our January Festivals which give opportunities for players to play in different formats in different teams growing both their cricketing and social skills as we seek to build not only resilient players but also good people.

Interschool Cricket continues to be a challenge as pressures on schools mean the timetabling of events or the compliance requirements placed on schools make this a challenging area to co-ordinate. Conventional festivals in the Intermediate space continue to be well supported but in younger age groups the structure of any offerings of the CJCA continues to be reviewed as there are also offerings in this space co-ordinated by Primary School Sport Canterbury.

The opening of the Sir Richard Hadlee Sports Centre in May 2022 has also meant the CJCA can access this for part of its Pre-season Training Programme which continues to provide a quality pre-season development

opportunity for Boys and Girls from Year 6. We thank the skilled coaches who make this an important activity of our Association. It's now positive that our players have access to a quality Centre year round at a cost that is affordable for most. The Association acknowledges and congratulates the Canterbury Cricket Trust for their work to complete this project.

The Association was able to assist the delivery of Awareness sessions by either Club personnel or other contractors. Special mention should be made of the Parklands Club who made a concerted effort to attract new players to the club from local schools which resulted in not only a popular Smash Play pre-competition programme but also six teams in the Kiwi grade which made the Parklands Domain a vibrant cricketing hub on a Saturday morning during the summer.

In addition to the new PlayHQ platform Clubs and Schools were also introduced to the new Smash Play Programme which provides a mechanism for the development of cricketing skills through a variety of game-based activities that can be used to introduce Cricketing Skills to those wishing to play the game. The CJCA thanks all the Clubs and Schools who proactively looked to use the available resources and coaching approaches and hopes that this programme continues to be developed by New Zealand Cricket and there continues to be support of more and better resources to make this an attractive nationally recognised and marketed programme that resonates with those new to the game.

The CJCA relationship with Christchurch Metro continues to flourish as we seek to service the whole of Christchurch Cricket between the two organisations. Operationally the relationship with especially Tim Murdoch in terms of Saturday Cricket

administration was a seamless transition after Mike Fisher's retirement.

Our relationship with the Christchurch City Council is vital and we thank John Furlong for his input in the maintenance and hopefully development of facilities for the use of our membership, not only in the short term but also in the mid to long term as we seek to be considered as the city grows in new directions. The 2022/23 season saw the utilisation of Lancaster Park as a Community Cricket venue for the first time since the Earthquakes and until morning grade cricket returns to the park the CJCA intends on utilising the huge space at the park for multiple Junior Outfield Cricket games each Saturday morning the drawcard of saying you've played on Lancaster Park may well be more of a thrill for the parents and grandparents than for those playing as many were not born when the park as we previously knew it. We also acknowledge Keryn Ambler in terms of his work with our Coaches in Clubland and Mike Harvey for his overarching support of the CJCA objectives.

Canterbury Cricket continue to be a supporter of the Association and we thank Simon Hill and notably Rebecca Gillett for her work in the participation space where she lead the new Girls Smash programme which is an important potential lead into bringing girls closer to playing our game in addition to supporting Clubs and Schools to bring the Smash Play Programme to life.

In closing we thank the Clubs and Schools for coping with the changes they have to make in the season just gone and wish to continue them through any additional changes to our operations in the years ahead.

Mike Johnston

Mike or as he is more affectionally known as 'Scrump' has been a long-time contributor to the community game for over forty years. Starting at the Le Bons Bay Club, North Canterbury / Canterbury Country Cricket, Canterbury Cricket, Metro Cricket and through to his ongoing contribution to cricket and sport at St Andrews College. All these organisations have benefited enormously from his unselfish, generous commitment to the game and its players.

Mikes playing career started as a 10-year-old for the Le Bons Bay Club filling in on the occasional Saturday afternoon. He recalls that Saturdays in summer were a happy family occasion, with Dad Peter playing, his mother and other siblings gathering on the outfield to run around, enjoy a picnic and at the conclusion of the days play, the combatants would gather round a four and half and set to right the ways of the world.

After playing at 1st X1 cricket at St Andrews Mike's career took him in several directions including playing overseas. He played 3 seasons for Lancaster Park premiers, and several seasons in England for the Eastcote Club where a character named Geoff Wilkins looked after Mike and provided him with opportunities to meet and mix with international cricketers including Alan Border, Kim Hughes and Rod Marsh. His cricketing odyssey then took him to Brisbane where he played for Western Suburbs Premier team against the likes of Carl Rackemann (who was frightening), Greg Chappell and the even more fearsome Jeff Thomson.

Mikes encounter with Greg Chappell provided him with one of his fondest memories when Chappell sat down with Mike post-game, and they chatted over a beer in a most amicable and friendly manner. Mike's encounter mid over with Jeff Thomson was briefer and more direct with Thommo questioning in explicit terms what he is doing batting in the middle and not hitting much. Mike responded saying he wasn't sure either.

Mike represented Canterbury at u19 and u23 levels also representing the Canterbury Kiwis. A determined left handed bat and very useful bowler his long association with the North Canterbury/ Canterbury Country Association top team began in the 1975/76 season through to 1992/93, playing 110 matches, scoring 4369 runs (including 5 centuries and 27 50's). He captained

the Hawke Cup team and was in teams that captured the Hawke Cup from Southland and Nelson.

Throughout this time Mike was working on the family farm and together with the Masefield's would make the long hike to Rangiora for rep team practice or matches and sometimes an even longer, later trip home after team bonding sessions. In 1991 Mike batted 626 minutes in a Challenge match against Southland batting through the innings for an unbeaten 125. Unfortunately, Southland snuck home to secure the 1st innings win and retain the prized Cup.

Canterbury Country Cricket not only benefitted from his playing ability but also from his love of coaching. In 1977 he started coaching primary school rep teams and graduated through to underage teams in the country and then into town. Mike co coached the Canterbury u19 team for five years and rates the 2009 team as a very special team indeed. Captained by Tom Latham, and containing Matt Henry, Logan Van Beek, Henry Nicholls and five others who played first class cricket they were a dominant side.

Mike was farming in partnership with Peter on the Peninsula. It was a lifestyle he loved with his strong work ethic and love of the outdoors. It was however hard work to make the farm profitable and sustainable. After Peters tragic accident in 1998 the pragmatic decision was made to sell the farm and relocate his mother and father to Halswell.

Through a meeting with Barry Maister and John Irving, the opportunity to work at St Andrews arose and this began the very happy association with the College which remains as strong today as it did 22 years ago. Head of Cricket, Ist X1 coach, Ist XV coach and manager, groundsman were Mikes official titles but his work has gone well beyond that. His overall commitment to the College has been incredible. He has been a mentor, guide and role model and has taken great pleasure in developing and encouraging good young people to reach their potential in life and sport after leaving school.

Mike has coached and managed numerous teams in rugby and cricket through his time at St Andrews. Both codes have enjoyed high level competition success with the cricket highlight being the Gillette

Cup victory in 2019. A number of former pupils have progressed to play First Class cricket while some have graduated to international level including Henry Nicholls, Logan Van Beek, Henry Shipley and Peter Borren. Mike believes Peter to be most talented cricketer he coached, and he holds Richie Mo'unga in the highest of regard for his humble and kind nature as well as his special rugby ability.

Mike has been a valued member of the Christchurch Metro Cricket Associations Youth Advisory Group for over 20 years, and he was made a Life Member of the Association in 2015. In 2019 he was the recipient of the inaugural Rector's Medal at St Andrews for his exceptional contribution to the College over his time there. He was also awarded a Lifetime Achievement Award from Sport Canterbury in 2020. These are very worthy accolades for a man who has given unstinting service to St Andrews, to sport and the community.

Mike is his father's son. Peter was a well-respected cricket administrator and volunteer for Le Bons Bay, for North Canterbury / Canterbury Country and Canterbury Cricket. Mike has the same values that Peter lived his life through. People of high integrity, humble, kind, giving not taking and dedicated to helping and supporting others, being of strong character and good values. Family has been an important ingredient of Mikes life. The example of his parents and his own family with his wife Angela and their children very supportive and understanding of his passion and his drive to continue giving to the school and the sporting community.



Aaron Johnstone

One of the best performed, most successful in terms of titles won and the holder of numerous individual records has decided that it's time to finish his very distinguished Premier Grade career.

Aaron Johnstone's illustrious career has spanned 22 seasons of service and high achievement for the St Alban Club from playing briefly for the Second-Grade team in 2001/02 to making over 400 Premier team appearances at the end of the 2022/23 season.

After playing junior cricket for Burnside West, Aaron attended St Bedes College where he played for the 1st XI for over 4 years. He recalls the team qualifying to play in the regional Gillette Cup Final where unfortunately they ran into a rampant Brendon McCullum who destroyed their Gillette Cup dream.

There were several very influential mentors in those early days, one being Stephen Cunis who played with a very competitive attitude and uncompromising approach on the field and helped mold Aaron into his own playing personality. Stephen Knox was another strong influence with a winning attitude. The St Albans Premier team in those times contained international players Chris Harris and Chris Martin, first class players in Cunis, Jarrod Englefield amongst others. Aaron would say that Chris Harris was the most talented player he played with while recounting one of his jobs when he first made the Premier team was to pick up Chris Martin (who had no car or driving license) and take him to cricket.

The numerous titles won by the St Albans Premier teams over Aaron's career totals 25, a remarkable statistic. He captained the team for eight seasons, winning 12 of the titles. There was a strong player nucleus who have been part of all those successes. Players like Ben Langrope who has played 315 games with Aaron, Greg Dawson 252, Matt Holstein 250, and James O'Gorman 250 games together. This group have been a constant playing presence and have displayed remarkable longevity in the game and their individual performances have been instrumental in the long run of success.

Aaron does pay a special tribute to his wife Sarah for her encouragement and support to enable him to play for such a long time. Friendship and companionship not only extended to the players but also to their wives, partners and children who have all become an integral component of the dynasty.

Aaron has seen significant changes in the role club cricket plays in the player pathway. Initially club cricketers' performances would be taken notice of in the selection of representative teams. International and First-Class cricketers would regularly play club cricket and the A team programme would be played on Sundays or mid-week. The position now is a far

cry from there with little or no attention given to Club cricket performances and top players being restricted to one or two games per season.

There have also been social changes that Aaron has witnessed over his career. When St Albans and other Premier clubs were based at Hagley Oval, there was a strong social element to the clubs' activities. Thursday nights in the clubrooms after practice was a lively place and could extend quite a while. Saturday nights after play had concluded, surrounded by players from other club teams, was an equally enjoyable time which all contributed to the cementing of strong and lasting friendships forged on the field and in the dressing sheds.

Cricket administration has benefited from Aaron's playing experience and business acumen. He spent 8 years on the St Alban management committee including a stint as Club Captain. He is a Director of the Christchurch Metro Association Board having been first appointed in 2015 and enjoys this role contributing to the strategic objectives of growing and sustaining club and community cricket.

Krish Macgregor

It can often be said that behind a successful man is an equally successful woman. That can certainly be said for Krish Macgregor and her husband Andy. While Richmond Club stalwart Andy has had 43 years in the game and is coming up for his 30th season for Richmond in this coming season, it might well be argued that Krish has made an equally valuable contribution to the game.

Krish is in her 8th year as Chair of Richmond CC after spending time on the committee. Chairman or President of sports clubs is normally the domain of men who can be people of strong character and fixed views. Krish recalls having a somewhat difficult introduction to the role of Chair but with her pragmatic and common-sense approach to the operation of the club this interference soon dropped away, and the club has certainly benefitted from her influence and skills.

Coming from a caring family environment with strong work ethics and a family entrenched in sport has certainly helped. Krish was a premier softball player and other family members were heavily involved with playing and coaching various sports teams. Marrying Andy meant cricket was always going to be a major part of their life together and with their son Taine, currently a member of the Shirley Boys High lst XI, this close involvement continues with Krish on the cricket committee at Shirley Boys.

Krish has been a member of the Metro Association Board for the past 6 years while also being a part of the school PTAs and School Boards. In these roles Krish



has brought business acumen, a prudent financial approach and an understanding of what is the role of governance and what is the role of management. Krish understands systems and processes well and her adherence to discipline around financial decisions and operational effectiveness has been central to her governance roles.

Krish was asked by the then Chairman of Metro Cricket Rick Horsfall to join the Board. This is a role Krish has really enjoyed, being in a sense the voice of lower grade cricketers but also contributing to the strategic direction and general stewardship of community cricket in Christchurch. She acknowledges the work of Rick and current Chair Bruce Findlay for their leadership of and commitment to the Association in some trying times while still maintaining the health and sustainability of the game. Through their leadership styles they allow the Board to express themselves freely and with confidence while respecting their views and opinions.

While making such a strong voluntary contribution to cricket, Krish has run her own Graphic/Garment Design business for 20 years. The business has been a source of great enjoyment to Krish, not only being her own boss and the flexibility that allows but allowing her to work alongside her sister for 12 years. Krish has self-taught herself the intricacies of screen printing and graphic design and the challenges that come along are met with the same determination and desire to succeed that she has brought to her cricket administration.

Krish has decided not to stand again for re-election as a Metro Board member. This decision has not been made easily but she feels it is time to balance out her many commitments. Metro will miss her insight, her straight talking and her pragmatism. Richmond Cricket will continue to benefit from her leadership as will Shirley Boys Cricket. They will be lucky beneficiaries of the fantastic service, attention and passion Krish brings to her work.

Volunteers are the life blood of our sport. Every club has numerous unsung heroes often doing the job because of their children playing or being former players themselves but all determined to contribute and make a difference.

Ady Simmons is one of those unselfish, unstinting volunteers who has indeed made a difference to the Old Boys Collegians Cricket Club and Metro Cricket over a 20 plus year period. Women's and girls' cricket has benefited from his service, time and contribution and Ady's decision to step back from his OBCC roles will be a hard act to follow.

The link with the OBC club began in 2000/01 when the family, having just returned to Christchurch from Nelson, were looking for a club for their children (Olivia, Bradley, and Jess) to join. Elmwood Park was close to home so began the enjoyable and successful relationship with the club. Ady initially coaching teams which included his children along with other parents who were making similar volunteer contributions. Ady coached OBCC girl's teams from primary through to U16 level seeing his daughters Olivia and Jess through



to this level before determining he has probably taken players as far as his coaching abilities could take them.

Ady himself originally had links to the Marist Cricket Club and was encouraged to assist Marist Cricket after working on the Marist Rugby club committee. One of his roles at Marist was to assist in the maintenance and upkeep of the grass blocks at Warren Park where Marist had their head quarters in the mid to late 1980's. Ady recalls driving a tractor from Ilam out to Warren Park to undertake rolling of the wickets.

From 2008 to 2014 Ady was on the CJCA committee with specific responsibilities to girl's cricket. They had a very hard-working girls subcommittee during this period with the likes of Gary Rountree, Brent Davidson, Paul Gray to mention a few and was well supported by Barry Hazeldine. He was involved, with others, in the rewriting of the playing conditions for girls' cricket which involved looking at what other Associations and countries were doing in this space. The result of this work saw changes to the length of games, games formats and team numbers, many of which are still in playing conditions these days.

Through this time Jess was coming through the various CJCA grades and Spring and Autumn festivals. In 2014 she was a member of a Metro team in the Inaugural Primary School Girls Tournament, which was held in Christchurch with 6 participating teams, including teams from Auckland, Nelson and South Canterbury. A glance through the team lists shows players who were at the tournament are now still involved and regular provincial players. These include Missy Banks, Jodie Dean, Abby Gerken, Jess Simmons, the Gagings from Nelson amongst others. Ady was himself very instrumental in the organisation and delivery of the event as the tournament director.

Ady has had a long involvement with the Metro Women's Advisory Group and is full of praise for the likes of Rachel Candy, Linda Pettigrew and others who have strived to create an environment to encourage young girls to play the game and stay in the game. At OBCC Ady acknowledges the very special contribution of Mandy Godliman to the women's and girl's game. Without her coaching and promotional support of the women's game then OBCC would not be in the position it is now. Others from within the club who Ady also rates highly for their valuable contributions are Graham Kench, Paul Knight, Amanda Hardy and Richard Lough.

Ady is not a man who seeks the headlines or the praise. He has been happy to make his contribution to the game through coaching and administration. He has loved seeing children playing and enjoying cricket, making progress with their game and making friends doing so. He acknowledges women's and girls'

cricket can be challenging and there is a need to be ever vigilant about trends in the game and to listen to the participants.

While he will not miss the early morning calls on a Saturday about filling teams he does and will always have a great passion for the game and will be keeping an eye on proceedings albeit not as close as he has previously. Saturdays and weekends might now be filled with more opportunities to watch Jess play her cricket in Christchurch and beyond.



OBITUARIES

Brian Salt

Salty, a wonderful and memorable stalwart of the Sydenham Cricket Club, passed away in October 2021. He was an aggressive middle to late order left hand batsman and a shrewd and economical purveyor of off spin bowling, albeit not a huge turner of the ball.



He joined Sydenham in the 1949-50 season and quickly graduated to the senior ranks where he remained until the mid-1970's as a permanent fixture and very influential and successful all-rounder.


Brian was an excellent Captain with ability to jell teams and players of strong character. He captained the Senior team to a competition title in 1965-66 and was recalled in 1980-81 to captain the team once again. His career statistics reveal what a good player he was, scoring 5994 runs and capturing 762 wickets, which is still the second highest wicket taker for the club over its 125 plus years.

His off-field contribution was no less significant. Selector, groundsman, committee member, popular bar manager were among some of the roles he performed. He was a well-deserved addition to the ranks of the clubs Life Members. Brian was a Canterbury representative team selector for 7 seasons and during his playing days represented Canterbury B.

The Sydenham Club have been blessed with many players who have been the backbone of the club on and off the field. Brian Salt was one of them and served the club with great distinction and pride. He was well deserving of the tag club legend.

Keith Thomson

Another Sydenham stalwart and legend Keith Thomson died, aged 81 in January 2023. He joined Sydenham in the 1958-59 season and played for the club until the late 1970's. He was a powerful and forceful batsman, known for his very low crouch at the crease and



combined with outstanding hand / eye coordination made him into a formidable player.

He quickly became a Canterbury First Class cricketer and represented the province from 1959-60 to 1973-74, scoring 2543 runs in 58 appearances. One of his proudest moments was his test debut (Black Cap 115) for New Zealand, here in Christchurch against the Indian team. He scored 69 in his first international innings and helped New Zealand to a rare test victory in those days.

Keith was a double international, also representing New Zealand in hockey in 28 tests from 1961 to 1971 including at the 1968 Olympics (Olympian 252).

Post his playing days, Keith achieved even more accolades when he became an International Hockey Umpire and a First-Class Cricket Umpire.

His Sydenham Club statistics detail his outstanding playing contribution to the club. In sixth place on the overall batting aggregates with 10,860 runs of which 8811 were senior grade runs. He was a strong captain who knew how to get the best out of his players and who was known to occasionally persuade opposition captains that "180 on this wicket would be a good target". Unsurprisingly either brother Bill, Keith himself or Richie Thomas would soon be smashing the ball all over Sydenham Park and the game would finish with time to spare and the opposition shaking their heads.

Keith was elected as a Life Member of Sydenham in 2016 and was also a Life Member of both New Zealand and Canterbury Hockey.

Keith and his brothers made an outstanding contribution to the Sydenham Club and to club cricket

in Christchurch over a long period. The Thomson name is synonymous with the Sydenham Club, and they have had considerable influence on the club and its fortunes.

Doreen Felton

Doreen, having just celebrated her 100th birthday, died in early April 2023. Together with her beloved late husband of 72 years Graham, they were wonderful supporters of sport, particularly cricket. They jointly presented programmes for better management skills and self-improvement to sports groups and in addition mentored individual sportspeople.

The Felton Trophy is a prestigious trophy awarded annually by the Canterbury Cricket Umpires and Scorers Association to the Individual who has made the biggest contribution to the Association over the season. First awarded in 1987, there are many notable names engraved on the Trophy. In 2004 Grahame and Doreen were awarded the Trophy. This was a very fitting acknowledgment of their joint contribution to and support of the umpires and scorers and the Association.

Vince Cusack

Vince was a well-known Burnside West University cricket man of long standing who worked assiduously on the grounds at Burnside Park. His hard work and long hours on the roller paid dividends as the pitches at Burnside were highly regarded as being amongst the best in Christchurch. Vince was also a well-known man's hairdresser in Christchurch who mentored many others in the industry. Vince died just before Christmas 2022, aged 85.

Neville Clark

Nev Clarke was a stalwart of the Heathcote Club in the 1970's and 1980's. He was a prolific run scorer for the Senior A team as well as being an outstanding fielder. In recent times Nev was a keen supporter of the club's teams, enjoying watching their performances and results.

Nic Greenwood

Nicholas (Nic) Greenwood, passed away after losing his battle with cancer in early March 2023.

Nic played for Old Collegians as a Junior and then when leaving Christ's College came back to Old Colls and played a mixture of both Seniors and Second Grade between 1988 and 1995.

After an absence Nic returned to Christchurch and worked for many years with Foodstuffs. He played

2 games for the Presidents team in 2018 and in his second and last match for OBC he scored a very polished 80 opening the batting.

Nic was a massive part of OCCC culture both on and off the field and several of the club teams wore a black armband to remember Nic in March 2023.

Andrew Bagshaw

Andrew was a much valued and respected member of the Merivale Papanui Club. He commenced his MPCC playing career in 1998/99 and played regularly over 9 seasons to 2007, last appearing in the Div.7 team in 2018/19. He died in tragic circumstances in Ukraine



where he had been working as an aid worker while trying to rescue an elderly woman.

Ethna Rouse

Ethna Rouse died in Christchurch in June 2023 aged 85. She had represented the New Zealand Women's team between 1972 and 1973, in one Test match and 3 One Day internationals. Ethna was a member of the successful team that toured




Australia and South Africa where she played in the First Test v South Africa. In 1973 she was a member of the New Zealand team who participated in the initial Women's World Cup.

Ethna was a long time Canterbury player representing the province from 1953/54 to 1973 playing over 50 matches and scoring nearly 1700 runs including 3 centuries. Ethna was a founding member of the Western Club which subsequently amalgamated with Lancaster Park in 1976/77. To recognise her service to the game, Ethna was made a Life Member of the Lancaster Park Club and an Honorary Member of New Zealand Cricket.

Netball was another game that benefitted from Ethna's service. She helped establish the St Nicholas Club and was a Life Member of that club and Christchurch Netball.

Ethna was awarded a QSM in 2004 for services to the Community. She made a huge contribution to women's sport and enjoyed passing on her knowledge and skills through coaching and teaching young children.



Old Collegians Cricket Club known as OBC is one of the country's largest and most prestigious clubs with over 500 active playing members.

The Jim Wakefield Pavilion in Elmwood Park, Merivale, was built after the old changing rooms were demolished and replaced with temporary portable buildings.

A family fun day was held on Saturday to mark the opening. It included members of Canterbury Cricket Community Team and a number of T20 games.

Statement of Accounting Policies

Christchurch Metropolitan Cricket Association Inc. For the year ended 31 July 2023

Basis of Preparation

Christchurch Metropolitan Cricket Assn Inc. ("Christchurch Metro") has elected to apply Tier 3 PBE SFR-A (NFP) Public Benefit Entity Simple Format Reporting - Accrual (Not-For-Profit) on the basis that it does not have public accountability and has total annual expenses equal to or less than \$2,000,000. All transactions in the Performance Report are reported using the accrual basis of accounting. The Performance Report is prepared under the assumption that the entity will continue to operate in the foreseeable future.

Goods and Services Tax (GST)

The entity is registered for GST. All amounts are stated exclusive of goods and services tax (GST) except for Accounts Payable and Accounts Receivable which are stated inclusive of GST.

Income Tax

Christchurch Metropolitan Cricket Association Inc. is wholly exempt from New Zealand Income Tax under section CW46 of the Income Tax Act 2007.

Assets

Accounts Receivables

Accounts Receivable are recognised initially at fair value and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less an allowance for any uncollectable amounts. Individual debts that are known to be uncollectable are written off in the period that they are identified.

Bank Accounts and Cash

Bank Accounts and Cash are short term, highly liquid investments that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of change in value.

Inventories

Inventories held for consumption in the provision of services that are not sold on a commercial basis are measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

For Inventory acquired through non-exchange transactions, the cost of the Inventory is its fair value at the date of acquisition. For Inventory held for the distribution or consumption in providing goods and services to be distributed at no charge or for nominal charge, these are measured at cost adjusted for any loss of service potential.

Property, Plant and Equipment

Items of Property, Plant & Equipment are measured at cost less accumulated depreciation.

Depreciation is charged on a straight line basis over the useful life of the asset, except for Land which is not depreciated. Depreciation is charged at rates calculated to allocate the cost or valuation of the asset less any estimated residual value over its remaining useful life:

Revenue Recognition

Donations, Fundraising and Other Similar Revenue

Donations are recognised as revenue upon receipt.

Grant Revenue includes grants given by charitable organisations, philanthropic organisations and businesses. Grant Revenue is recognised when the conditions attached to the grant have been complied with. Where there are unfulfilled conditions attached to the grant, the amount relating to the unfulfilled condition is recognised as a liability (future income) and released to income as the conditions are fulfilled.

Interest Revenue

Interest Revenue is recognised as it accrues, using the effective interest rate method.

Fees and Subscriptions Revenue

Revenue is recognised over the period of the membership or subscription (usually the cricket season). Amounts received in advance for memberships or subscriptions relating to future periods are recognised as a liability until such time that period covering the subscription or membership occurs.

Employee Entitlements

Liabilities for wages and salaries and annual leave are recognised in surplus or deficit during the period in which the employee provided the related services. Liabilities for the associated benefits are measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liabilities are settled.

Changes in Accounting Policies

There have been no changes in accounting policies. Policies have been applied on a consistent basis with those of the previous reporting period.

Investments

Investments in Securities controlled by Christchurch Metro are classified as available for sale and are stated at fair value, with any resulting gain or loss recognised as income in the Statement of Financial Performance.



Limited over cricket was first played at club level in 1969-70 when a knock-out competition, with the sponsorship of the ANZ Bank, was begun. All senior clubs played plus teams representing the Christchurch Suburban Association and each of the Districts.

The winners were:

- West Christchurch University (1969-70, 70-71, 71-72) and Burnside West Christchurch University (1976-77)
- Riccarton (1972-73)
- Old Collegians (1973-74, 74-75, 78-79)
- High School Old Boys (1975-76)
- Lancaster Park (1977-78)

The ANZ Bank then channelled its sponsorship into the Senior Two-Day competition and the one-day competition fell into abeyance for the next two seasons. However, in 1981-82, while continuing to finance the major competition, the One-Day format, called the ANZ Cup, re-emerged.

For the 1983-84 season, the sponsorship changed and the one-day trophy was known as the Chancery Finance Trophy.

During the 1981-82 season the CCA instituted a new and separate limited over competition, which in the first three years was played over 55 overs. Since that time it has been played over 50 overs with the rules closely following the Domestic One Day Competition.

In the first three years the eight senior teams were divided into two pools with the winners of each pool playing off in the final. However, in the 1984-85 season the competition was extended to a full round robin with the 10 senior teams now playing each other once. This round robin has continued until today, apart from the 1988-89 season, where the competition returned to a pools format.

Up to 1987-88 the senior averages and career records combine the results from both the one and two day competitions. However, during the 1988-89 season the CCA decided to fall into line with domestic and International protocol separating averages for the 1 and 2 day competition

With the growth of Twenty20 Cricket, Mid Canterbury Cricket started a four-team tournament in 2004/05 which the winners of the Christchurch One-Day competition attended. This event continued for two years and as the popularity of Twenty20 cricket continued to grow, a mid-week knock out competition was played among the Christchurch Premier teams.

In 2007/08 a Show Weekend tournament was introduced for the Christchurch teams and this continued until 2015/16.

At this stage the Dick Motz Series was introduced, incorporating the eight Premier teams and four from the Senior Suburban competition. This lasted two seasons before a full round robin was introduced for the Premier teams in 2018/19.

Through the early years of the competition records were not kept in all cases so the information below is only accurate for all players from 2014/15 onwards. For those clubs that have kept full records or who have been able to track down scorebooks, all available information is accurate.
