

EXPLORING FAITH

YEAR 7 CONNECT MARA KAI GARDEN PROJECT

This year the Year 7 students have prepared, composted, planted, watered, weeded, and then harvested in the Mara kai! Broccoli and spinach have been our most successful crops so far. The Lower Hutt Foodbank has greatly received our donations. Even though they are somewhat small in quantity, fresh produce is in high demand due to the rising costs of fruit and vegetables.

We have established some valuable connections through this project. Sarah Bourke, Food technology teacher, has worked with the Year 7 students to use vegetables from the garden in their cooking projects during class. The canteen has been using the garden with Shobha Kalyan using herbs from the garden as garnishes for her canteen food. Natalie Evans, Year 7 parent, volunteers at the Lower Hutt Foodbank and has provided us with guidance on how and when to donate our produce.

YEAR 9 SERVICE PROJECT

Here are some of our wonderful Year 9s in Exploring Faith in their end-of-module service project. The students were asked to do a small act of love for our local community and they decided on the Hutt Hospital as their focus. The girls wanted to bake for the hospital staff and make cards for the patients. I connected with the Hutt Hospital Chaplain, Kathryn van Woerkem and she suggested they bake afternoon tea for the medical ward on Level 5 that is run off its feet. Nine of the Year 9 students offered to give up their lunchtime to deliver their gifts to the hospital. Kathryn met us and then invited us up to the medical ward where the students were able to personally deliver their baking to Ingrid, the head of the medical ward. We then were asked to hand deliver our cards and origami creations to patients on the ward. The students were grumpy, however, our students were lovely and polite at all times. This was a wonderful opportunity for our students and I was very proud of them and how they so lovingly carried out their act of service

SENIORS EXPLORING FAITH

We were excited to launch our modular courses for Senior students in Exploring Faith classes this year. This has enabled students to have more agency and ownership in their learning in this curriculum space. During terms one to three, students opted to study a wide variety of topics, including some of our more popular courses: 'Spirituality and Spotify': the relationship between music and the soul (Year 11), Sects and Cults - what is the difference? (Year 12) and Forgiveness and Reconciliation: a practical approach (Year 13). Gathering feedback from all three year groups about our new modular approach revealed that senior students overwhelmingly prefer an element of choice about what courses they explore in our weekly sessions.

Being creative in our approach to Exploring Faith has also enabled some rich learning outside the classroom. For example, our Year 11 students who took the Caring for Creation course explored what it means to be a kaitiaki before enjoying a tour of the school gardens with Catherine, our school gardener. Students painted a plant pot to give to someone they consider to be a kaitiaki, a small act of kindness for those who care for others or the environment.

CRUIZE KIWI

This year in Business Studies, we (Grace Olsen and Lauren Excell) created CruiseKiwi business with the Young Enterprise Scheme. CruiseKiwis' everyday guide to breakdowns is a small booklet for young drivers to keep in their glove box, which contains all the information on what to do in minor accident or breakdown situations. We decided to create a business dedicated to road safety after attending the RYDA safety course, both getting our restricted licences and realising how little we knew about what to do in an auto situation if one were to occur.

We were lucky enough to receive funding and some of their expert knowledge from trusted organisations like Hutt City Council, YouthLaw and Tuffy Auto Centre, who loved what we were doing and wanted to support us to go further. We also received an additional \$200 seed funding from YES. With the help of their funding and advice from our mentors Jarrod and Roger, our business was able to reach our goals and make a substantial profit. 50% of which we are donating to Road Safety Education, which provides the RYDA courses which inspired our product to hopefully inspire more young kiwis to take initiative.

Our achievements as a business include being one of the top 4 businesses in the greater Wellington region meaning we got the opportunity to pitch in the regional finals. We were also a finalist for the YES Innovation award and we received the National runner up award for Social Enterprise.








BOARD OF TRUSTEES

The Board operates with 12 trustees - five elected parents, four representatives from the Board of Proprietors, the Principal, a teacher representative (elected by the staff), and a student representative (elected by the students). The Board of Trustees met regularly throughout the year via a combination of in person and Zoom meetings taking place.

Loss also means gain for us in these roles and we welcomed Ms Ilana de Ras as Assistant Principal, Ms Chris Holden as Director of Finance and Property, and will welcome Ms Amanda Gibbs as our new Principal starting in 2024.

Change also allows for growth and the Board wants to acknowledge Ms Cindy Ford for taking on the Acting Principal role for a large part of 2023, and Mrs Natasha Parsons for stepping up into the Acting Deputy Principal – Achievement and Professional Growth role. Thank you both.


