

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OBITUARIES

Andrew John Hintz

8 December 1963 – 7 February 2016

Andrew appeared at cricket grounds at an early age following his father, Reg, to lower grade matches with West Christchurch University CC and then as a young player for the Burnside West Christchurch University CC as Reg found his way to the Presidents Grade. Andrew would often fill in for his father's team and there was a nice coincidence that Andrew's last game of cricket was with the Burnside West University Presidents team in the 2014-15 season.

In between time, Andrew had an impressive cricketing career. He played for Christchurch Boys' High School, Burnside West University Seniors and for Canterbury. He played six matches at first class level (1985/86 – 1987/88) with a top score of 62 while taking 11 wickets with



a best performance of 3-51. He played ten matches in the one-day format for Canterbury from 1986/87 to 1987/88. During this time, he had a top score of 32no and took 17 wickets at 21.11 with a best performance of 4-23.



Derek Clarence Burrell

31 January 1952 – 21 November 2015



Derek's contribution to rugby and cricket was no better exemplified than by those who attended his funeral on a beautiful summer's day in

the middle of the sports ground where he spent so much of his time playing and coaching at Rawhiti Domain.

The popularity and respect for Derek was borne out by the large numbers who attended on that day when those gathered

heard from speakers representing Canterbury Rugby and his New Brighton Cricket Club. I suspect he never more enjoyed his cricket than playing with his sons, Andre and Wade.

After leaving Hagley High School he played for the Sydenham Club senior side as a punishing middle order batsman. He moved to the Christchurch Suburban Senior competition in the 1980s when he joined New Brighton CC and played through to the early 2000s. During the 1980s Derek played for, and captained, the Suburban rep side and he became a selector in the 1988-89 season. He won the CSCA Peter Russell Trophy for service

to Christchurch Suburban cricket. Derek was also a regular feature at The Willows Cricket Club at Loburn.

Derek also made a significant contribution to Canterbury Underage rugby where he selected and coached at Under 16 level in the late 1990s and 2000s.

He was made a Life Member of the Christchurch Metropolitan Cricket Association in October 2015.

Kathleen Ann Pawson

11 July 1951 – 27 April 2016



Not long ago, on any given summer Saturday, you could drop in at Burwood Park, or wherever the East Christchurch Shirley Premier team was playing, and you'd come

across those travelling wilburys: the parents Papps, Johnstons, Bursons and Pawsons. You'd see them, wagons circled, rugged up, picnic nearby and a transistor and a Best Bets within reaching distance. They would hold strong opinions about the match and woe betide that umpire who got the decision wrong!

They were true supporters that are the backbone of any club. The weather was no deterrent for they had something in common in the support of their sons, their team and their club.

When hosting a match, they had the first class view from a first class pavilion. When playing away, they enjoyed the sun or braved the easterly no matter what, no matter where.

They enjoyed the match and they enjoyed the after-match.

Kathy Pawson was at the heart of this group.

Mother of Scott and Jason (and Kirsten), and wife of Brian, she embodied all

that is good about local sport and club life: always welcoming, fiercely loyal, always pleasant. It is these supporters, with their children and grand-children, who help create that marvellous club atmosphere that is the East Shirley club rooms; something of a throw-back to an earlier era. Teams want to go back to their club rooms to share and enjoy this atmosphere.

Kathy will be sadly missed; but, from hearing those humorous eulogies at her funeral, those happy memories will always bring a smile and her spirit will always be present.

15 April 1934 – 29 November 2015



Terry gave great service to cricket.

As an umpire, he stood at senior level in the Christchurch competition and he progressed to the first class scene in 1980

when he stood in the New Zealand Under 23 v Canterbury match. He umpired seven first class matches in total with his last in February 1988.

His passion and service to cricket did not stop there for he took up scoring in

which he excelled to the International level in Women's cricket. Terry scored in the Women's World Cup of 2000-01 and continued at this level through to March 2008. In total, he scored in 22 Internationals involving India, England and Australia against New Zealand. He also scored at several National Under 19 tournaments at Lincoln where, for a large part, he was aligned with the Canterbury team.

Of course he was a very familiar and respected figure around the local cricket grounds where he scored for the Lancaster Park Woolston Premier team from 1991 for 24 years and over 330 matches. In addition, he scored for the

Canterbury Country senior representative team from 2000-01 to the time of his death; during this long service he shared in their Hawke Cup successes.

His professionalism was always appreciated and he was meticulous in his book work and embraced any change in scoring delivery; in his late 70s Terry took to scoring on this laptop with a run sheet.

Terry was a Life Member of the Lancaster Park Woolston Cricket Club.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

After a lifetime of playing and coaching cricket, it has been a pleasure to take on the position of President of Christchurch Metropolitan Cricket Association (CMCA) who has responsibility for promoting, developing and managing community cricket within secondary schools and clubs in Christchurch.

The pathways of competitions and different format opportunities coordinated by CMCA successfully cater for a growing number of nearly 6,000 youth and adult cricketers of varying ages, genders, abilities and interests, as well as foster a sizeable pool of talent that both underpins the success of its teams in national development and age-group tournaments, as well as the high performance efforts of Canterbury Cricket Association's (CCA) representative teams.

The role of President provides the opportunity to interact with the CMCA's obliging and capable staff (Mike Harvey, Mike Fisher, Keryn Ambler), who are dedicated to leading and organising the community game in the city and facilitating strategies to promote its development. It also allows attendance at the regular CMCA Board meetings which are professionally and effectively run by Ashley Taggart, who is an inclusive, but decisive, Chairman. Thank you to the staff and the Board members for their selfless contribution to the effective functioning of CMCA and their commitment to the best interests of the game and its players. This is done in a fiscally-responsible manner, which sees the association with a sound financial base, although this has not been achieved at the expense of the game's effective operation.

My involvement with CMCA has allowed me to witness the association not only continue to come to grips with its relatively recent role and settle into its new Bealey Avenue premises, but also grapple with trying to maximise the use of its staff and resources for the betterment of cricket in the city. This sees them currently, after a series of post-season reviews that discussed competition formats, scheduling, start times, and strategies to better link secondary

school and youth cricketers, beginning to incorporate the emergent outcomes into a new strategic plan, which CMCA are preparing for the next three years. This seeks to strengthen the collaborative partnerships with CCA and Christchurch Junior Cricket Association (CJCA) in order to provide all players with a range of appealing opportunities that satisfy their needs and allows them to achieve their potential through and in the sport.

The quality of cricket in the city continues to be reflected in the national secondary school and club development tournaments. Canterbury was creditably represented by Christchurch Boys' High School who finished third in the Secondary School 1st XI Cup (previously the Gillette Cup), St Andrew's College who were runners-up in the New Zealand Community Trust Junior Boys' Cup, and Villa Maria College who were fifth in the New Zealand Community Trust Girls' Cup. While on the club scene, St Albans were runners-up in the New Zealand Community Trust National Club Championships hosted annually by Cornwall Cricket Club in Auckland.

At the local level, I had the privilege of viewing a considerable amount and diversity of cricket during the summer from excited youngsters beginning the game to competitive Premier cricketers, as well as the Canterbury and Black Caps teams featuring at Hagley Oval. In the Premier men's grade St Albans won both the T20 and one day contests, while Sydenham, under the tutelage of veteran player-coach Chris Harris, were deserved victors in the two day competition. Chris was also named Club Player of the Year. In the Senior A grade the trophy for the overall winner went to Sumner; format winners included T20 - Addington, one day - Sumner, and two day - Sumner.



In the Premier women's grade Old Boys' Collegians took out the T20 series and Lancaster Park Woolston won the one day competition with the latter club's Frances Mackay named Club Player of the Year. Across the other CMCA grades there was a good spread of clubs winning competitions. For overall consistency, however, the prestigious Petersen Shield for club supremacy was awarded to St Albans.

The popularity and success of cricket in Christchurch is not only attributable to the quantity and quality of its players, but to the guidance offered by the CMCA staff and Board, the supportive partnerships with CCA, CJCA, Sport Canterbury, Gaming Trusts and sponsors, and the goodwill and commitment of the many administrators, coaches, umpires, scorers and groundsmen, most of whom are volunteers, who oversee and service the game and its players. As President of the CMCA I would like to thank all these individuals and organisations for the many and varied contributions they make to underpinning cricket at a community level.

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

Following a very successful year, it is a privilege to present both the 2015/2016 Annual General Report on behalf of the Board and Management of the Christchurch Metropolitan Cricket Association (CMCA) and this Chairman's Report.

Board

The CMCA is well governed by its Board comprising Ric Horsfall, Bruce Findlay, Rob Dixon, Fergus Smith, Aaron Johnson, Alec Astle (the President of the CMCA) and myself. In this regard, Alec was appointed as President of the CMCA at the 2015 Annual General Meeting. As many of you will know, Alec has been involved in cricket for much of his working life. He brings to the CMCA a considerable amount of knowledge as to those cricket programmes and initiatives which lead to the betterment of cricket and the development of our youth players, along with a strong desire to support those people who are involved in maintaining and growing high school and club cricket.

I wish to thank former President Trevor Luke for his work as President of the CMCA. Trevor stood down at the 2015 Annual General Meeting. Trevor was the inaugural President of the CMCA. His skills in managing finances and strategy have been instrumental to the CMCA now having both a solid financial foundation and strong partnerships with its key cricket partners.

Management

Management of the CMCA is led by Mike Harvey, its General Manager. Mike's drive to do those things needed for the betterment of cricket is at the heart of the on-going success of the CMCA and the high quality relationship that it enjoys with its members and those other

organisations which it is affiliated to and/or works with. The success of the Board in governing the CMCA is also positively influenced by the quality of the monthly material and papers which Mike provides the Board with – all of which greatly assist the Board in making sound decisions. He also constructively leads the staff and volunteers and ensures that they have the tools to meet and exceed their objectives. He, also with those staff under him, continues to grow and mature the CMCA brand throughout the cricket market place; that brand now being well-regarded and recognised.

Mike Fisher runs the CMCA's operations. As many of you will be aware, Mike's workload is significant, but nonetheless he performs his role to a high standard and continues to take on more work so as to ensure that cricket in Christchurch continues to be the pre-eminent area within which to play cricket in. There has been (and there continues to be) significant investment from the Christchurch City Council, the CMCA and its member clubs and high schools into cricket facilities and in particular the maintenance and upgrading of cricket pitches and outfielders and the addition of new parks to play cricket at. Mike is leading this combined effort for the CMCA. In the last 18 months we have started to see the very real benefit of this investment, with both our quantitative and qualitative analysis evidencing that facilities are improving and consequently



those people playing cricket are having a better experience. If we are to both attract and retain cricketers, and provide them with a positive cricket experience, our attention needs to be continued around the delivery of quality facilities.

The CMCA's work in the area of Youth Cricket continues to increase, with Keryn Ambler leading this aspect of the organisation. Keryn's initiatives in and around both new playing formats and providing real pathways for players from high schools into clubs has been a key contribution to increasing numbers of people playing Youth cricket and a higher percentage of Youth cricketers transitioning into Club cricketers. The CMCA and its Board are focussed on taking pro-active steps to create a seamless pathway for cricketers from junior to adult.

Financial

Through a combination of prudent financial management and constructive relationships with the CMCA key funding partners, the CMCA has been able to meet and exceed its historical cash reserves target. Those reserves now rest on term deposit with an institutional lender and allow the organisation to receive some interest from that investment. Those reserves only provide the CMCA with a small financial base, certainly not an amount significant enough that it can stop proactively procuring revenue for the organisation. However, it is a meaningful start. The CMCA has, over recent months, been meeting with its members and stakeholders for the purpose of agreeing on a new Strategic Plan. An outcome of that process, and then recorded in a new strategic plan, ought to be a new cash reserves target which is considerably greater than the current level of reserves. Once reserves are built to a certain amount, they ought to provide the CMCA with a buffer for a poor financial year or years, and also importantly, they should allow the organisation to develop a new income stream or streams from the mixed investment of those reserves. This in itself should provide greater financial security for the CMCA and consequently grassroots cricket in Christchurch. This has to be at the forefront of everyone's minds.

The CMCA is grateful for its positive relationships with key financial partners, New Zealand Cricket, Canterbury Cricket Association and numerous charitable organisations (including Air Rescue, Community Services, Mainland Foundation, NZ Community Trust, Pub Charity, Southern Trust, Youth Town, Lion Foundation, Canterbury Community Trust, Trust Aoraki and Christchurch Earthquake Recovery Trust) and its members

through subscriptions. For the purpose of providing high-quality grassroots cricket to the many thousands of players throughout Christchurch, the continued financial support of these organisations is absolutely critical.

Clubs and Schools

Congratulations to all those who participated in the various forms of cricket offered by the CMCA this past season. The season has seen another increase in the number of people playing cricket in Christchurch, following increases over the prior two years. This is likely a consequence of new grades and formats being introduced over that period and the continued growth of those grades, the consistently strong and unified performances of the Black Caps, the many benefits still being seen from the Cricket World Cup, the dedication and performance of the CMCA's staff, and, most importantly, the tremendous level of commitment and dedication demonstrated by the hundreds of volunteers throughout Christchurch's many clubs and schools. Without this growing base of volunteers, the objectives of the CMCA could not be met. Accordingly, the CMCA is gratefully appreciative of all of the volunteers and their continued efforts and achievements.

In this regard, the 2015/2016 prize giving was a wonderful night in respect of not only being an occasion to celebrate the successes of the players and teams throughout the many grades of the CMCA, but also as a forum for recognising the services and milestones of our volunteers. Similarly, the upcoming Annual General Meeting and Golf Day provide us all with another opportunity to recognise the contributions of many of the volunteers involved in our schools and clubs and generally to share in and enjoy each other's company.

Christchurch Junior Cricket Association

The CMCA's relationship with the Christchurch Junior Cricket Association (CJCA) continues to go from strength to strength. Its new general manager and our staff work closely and constructively for the purpose of delivering cricket to junior players. Our Board is also lucky to have the Chairman of the CJCA join our monthly board meetings. These initiatives, collectively, provide the two organisations with transparency across their operations and objectives and, in part, result in strong strategic alignment between the two. The CMCA, both its Board and staff, enjoy working collaboratively with the CJCA and consider there to be many opportunities for improving the delivery of cricket to all players through these two bodies continuing to work closely together.

Canterbury Cricket Association

The CMCA has a strong and positive working relationship with the CCA. The CMCA's main financial and cricket partner is the CCA, who provides both grants to the CMCA and also assists with matters around cricket programmes, initiatives and the delivery of those. With the CCA's ongoing support, the CMCA is well-placed to continue to deliver high quality grassroots cricket programmes throughout Christchurch.

Conclusion

I look forward to seeing as many of you as possible at the upcoming Annual General Meeting and Golf Day.

GENERAL MANAGER'S REPORT

Following a busy off-season of planning, Christchurch Metro Cricket entered the 2015/16 in a positive frame of mind, with an increase in team numbers across most categories.

At our Annual General Meeting in October 2015 we said farewell to Trevor Luke, who had completed his three year term as President. Trevor made an outstanding contribution during his tenure and we hope his services and skills will not be lost to cricket completely.

We were delighted to welcome former NZ Cricket Development Manager and Sport NZ Community Sport Manager, Alec Astle, to the role of President. Alec, like Trevor, has much to offer at the community level and we look forward to his involvement.

We have received outstanding support over the season from Lee Germon, Mark Cini, Trudy Anderson and the team at Canterbury Cricket (CCA). Our two organisations work closely together at a number of levels, and we look forward to this continuing to ensure the betterment of cricket in the City.

Our alignment also continues to strengthen with the Christchurch Junior Cricket Association (CJCA). The CJCA President attends CMCA Board meetings, while the CMCA Development Manager is a member of the CJCA Executive. We also welcome the CJCA Manager, Barry Hazeldine, to our offices on a weekly basis. Barry has recently announced he is stepping down from the role, and on behalf of the CMCA I wish to acknowledge the work that Barry has done for the betterment of cricket during his eight year tenure and wish him well for his future.

At the community level we deal closely with the NZ Cricket Development team, and I wish to thank the recently departed Ed Shuttleworth, Richard Pithey, Elaine Nolan, Ben Ramsey and Simon Hill for their support of Christchurch Metro Cricket.

We are also fortunate to receive outstanding support from Game Plan Financial Management Services, who manage our monthly and end-of-year accounts. My thanks to Kerry Dellaca, Amy Harris, Wendy Caldwell and Joy Reddiford for their support.

Strategic Plan

The inaugural CMCA Strategic Plan concludes in 2016 and we are currently working through the process of updating the document.

During the last three years we can point to significant progress towards the achievement of the five goals that were set out as priorities. While this has been the case, much of the current plan still remains relevant and the Board, staff and stakeholders will all be invited to provide input into our new plan, which will aim to establish priorities for the next three year term.

Club Season

A summary of grade winners can be found elsewhere in the report and congratulations goes to all winners. However, only a small percentage of teams can claim honors in a given year and Christchurch Metro Cricket would



like to also acknowledge all teams who maintained the commitment and energy through the six-month season for the enjoyment and camaraderie that the game provides.

We also thank all who have taken the time to provide feedback to us on the strategic direction of the club competitions, be it through our stakeholder surveys, club meetings or advisory group meetings.

While we value all feedback, we also acknowledge that with such a wide and varying number of opinions that not all stakeholders will be satisfied with outcomes. Rest assured all decisions are made with the good of the game in mind. We have a number of exciting new initiatives planned for the 2016-17 season aimed at keeping the competitions fresh and relevant to the current group of players. These include:

- Introduction of the Metro Premier League Twenty20 competition
- Re-structuring of afternoon grade formats
- Overhaul of the structure of women's cricket to create significant improvements for the club and representative pathway

Cricket simply would not function without the support of the vast number of volunteers, who are the lifeblood of the sport. Be it on a club committee, coaching, scoring, providing transport to youngsters or other support, these contributions are all invaluable.

I often hear that volunteers are a dying breed, and that they are hard to come by. I always counter this argument by stating that every junior team I have come across in seven years of coaching has a coach, a scorer and umpiring support, players are transported to games and trainings week in, week out and that committee numbers are strong, with examples of some clubs even having to turn people away.

In my experience the average person is happy to volunteer as long as expectations are clear and appropriate support and training is provided. It can be a great way to meet people and give something back to the community.

Congratulations to our Volunteer Award winners for 2015-16, Ray Steele (Sumner), Dave Robertson (Burnside West), Graeme Harris (Sydenham), Brett Williamson (New Brighton) and Sandra Steere (Lancaster Park Woolston). Deciding these winners is a tough task, which is testament to the number of outstanding volunteers involved in Christchurch cricket.

Canterbury Cricket Umpires and Scorers Association

One of the key relationships for the CMCA is with the Canterbury Cricket Umpires and Scorers Association (CCUSA). During the season we said farewell to incumbent President David Herber and welcomed new President David Brandon.

The new David has been proactive in building on the progress made by the old David and has introduced some exciting new projects aimed at boosting umpire numbers.

As they say, it is the best seat in the house and it is never too early to start, so through the CCUSA, basic umpire training is delivered at junior and youth level. There has also been a number of new umpires join the adult ranks this season.

Thanks to David and all umpires and scorers who have graced the grounds of Christchurch this season.

Youth Cricket

Youth results and achievements are listed elsewhere in the document, and once again, congratulations go to those who have been recognised for their achievements.

Youth cricket remains a high priority for the CMCA. Our Development Manager works closely with schools and, through the support of our funding partners, we have been able to provide financial assistance to schools to support their coaching programmes and Year 9 camps. As we move forward a key goal is to continually improve the alignment between schools and clubs and we have a number of projects assisting with this important transition.

Thanks to the Youth Advisory Group who provide guidance and support to the CMCA throughout the season.

Representative

The CMCA offered a comprehensive representative programme during the season. Our Senior A Representative team played three fixtures, with the annual fixture against Canterbury Country being rained off. Wins were recorded against The Willows, Mid Canterbury, and South Canterbury. Thanks to James Carr, who took over the captaincy this season, and to Leighton Johnstone, Dann Vann and Mike Fisher who assisted with selections.

Two Christchurch Metro teams entered the Men's Under 17 Boys' regional tournament and Under 15 Boys' regional tournament, while one team played in the Youth Girls' tournament.

Christchurch Metro won all three tournaments for the second consecutive season which was a pleasing result.

A sincere thanks to the coaches, umpires and scorers who assist with the representative programmes. You are all a key part of our game and we appreciate the time you put into the game.

Finances

Financial health is an important strategy for Christchurch Metro Cricket and was recognized in our strategic Plan with an aim of \$50,000 of reserves within three years. We are pleased to report that we have now achieved and exceeded this goal. CLUB & YOUTH OPERATIONS REPORT

Introduction

There were two references in last year's Operations Report that continue to resonate in the 2015-16 season: the brilliant weather in which we enjoyed our cricket throughout the summer and the ongoing quality of the cricket that we enjoyed at the splendid Hagley Oval. McCullum's belligerent swan-song against the Australians will live long in the memory!

To the local club scene, our Adult numbers were up from the previous season while Youth numbers held their own.

There were some problems with the provision of grass pitches as a number of our parks were taken out for renovations to the outfields as well as the loss of Hospital Corner and Ilam Fields for significant periods. The upside to these issues is that we will be gaining quality grounds on Hospital Corner and six new artificial pitches on the Polo Grounds. As well, many of the artificials around our Christchurch parks have been resurfaced by the Christchurch City Council.

Again, local club cricket had restricted access to playing on Hagley Oval due to International and first class commitments. Those who were privileged to play there loved the experience and it was pleasing to note that Ross Hastings scored a century for the Merivale Papanui Presidents team while his daughter, Jess, scored an unbeaten 60 in leading her team to victory in the Women's Div 1 final. As well, Jarrod Cookson scored a dashing hundred for the Riccarton Premiers.

There has been positive feedback around the use of the draws/results package of CricHQ and more grades will be using full scoreboards on a weekly basis which provides weekly stats for clubs and individuals.

Our Senior A rep team met with further success against The Willows CC, South Canterbury and Mid Canterbury and some promising younger players are coming through in this area.

Adult cricket

The Premier Two-day competition was won by Sydenham who clinched the trophy on the final day. This was just reward for the team building and patience shown by the club after taking some fearful losses in the previous seasons. There was batting substance provided by Chris Harris with the growing maturity of a fine bowling unit spearheaded by the Gardner brothers.

St Albans were again successful in the Premier One-day format with a strong victory on the Reserve day over the hapless Lancaster Park Woolston team who could consider themselves unlucky. A freak hailstorm ended the final prematurely with Park at 150/0 after 28 overs. They returned the next weekend only to succumb rather meekly. Again Saints performed with style at the National tournament only to lose in the final for a fourth occasion. St Albans reinforced their credentials as the top club in Christchurch with victory in the Twenty20 final.

Sumner dominated the Senior A formats with competition winners in both the Two-day and One-day competitions. Addington won the Twenty20 final in a rain-shortened competition.

Old Boys Collegians dominated the Premier Women's One-day competition until the final when Lancaster Park Woolston rolled over the top of them through the quite brilliant exploits of Frankie Mackay. A century and then 5 wickets for 3 runs showed her genuine quality as an all-rounder. Burnside West Christchurch University won the Walter



Hadlee Trophy while the Petersen Shield for club supremacy was secured by St Albans.

DEVELOPMENT REPORT

It was again a busy season, this time due to the Cricket World Cup aftermath and Legacy projects.

The success of the Black Caps at the Cricket World Cup positively raised the profile of cricket. As a result, an increase of players was seen in Christchurch. This season and the next few are very important as the challenge after increasing numbers is to retain them by providing quality experiences.

We were fortunate to have some quality international cricket hosted at Hagley Oval this season. This saw all of club and school cricket postponed on the weekend the Black Caps played the Australians, giving local players the opportunity to support our national test team. We were also able to give away over 200 tickets to primary and secondary school students on day three and four of the test thanks to New Zealand Cricket.

Our member clubs play an important role in the delivery of a number of Development Programmes in their local area. Clubs are funded to deliver coaching in their local schools, umpiring in our Friday Superstar Cricket Competitions, and the running of a Superstar Cricket Academy centre. With this structure, clubs can build healthy relationships between the club and their local primary and secondary schools. Clubs provide engaging development sessions during the school day in primary schools, as well as providing skilled coaches at secondary school trainings. I must give thanks to the clubs who exceed the expected number of sessions to further contribute to

the development of cricket in their community.

For the second year running, Christchurch Metro teams won all three Regional tournaments. The Under 15 tournament saw a nail-biting finish to the final against Canterbury Country. The Metro players finally holding their nerve to prevail by one wicket. In the Under 17 age group we had a particularly strong group of players and both our Red and Black teams reached the final. The Metro girls' team won both of their matches with relative ease. With these results Christchurch Metro players were well represented in the Canterbury representative team with well over half the teams made up of Christchurch players. Congratulations to the Under 17 and Under 19 men's teams for winning their respective national tournaments.

In the Secondary School Boys' First XI Cup Christchurch Boys' High School continued their dominance at a Canterbury level. After winning the last three National titles, they finished a respectable third this season. St Andrew's College beat Christchurch Boys' High School in a gripping regional final to earn the right to represent Canterbury at the NZCT Junior Boys' tournament. St Andrew's opened their campaign with a lost to the eventual winners but they finished strongly and ended up second in New Zealand. Villa Maria College represented Canterbury at the NZCT Secondary Schoolgirls tournament. They played with a lot of



pride and the girls gained some good experience over the week finishing the tournament in fifth place.

This season a good number of coaches were upskilled through our Coach Development Programme. 33 new coaches were trained through one of our Foundation courses, delivered locally at cricket clubs, 49 coaches on our Coaching a Cricket Team course and 33 coaches qualified as Level One coaches. The Christchurch Junior Cricket Association did a fantastic job promoting these courses to their junior coaches and gaining funding to support and cover many of the coaches' course fees.

I am delighted to acknowledge the contributions and support Sport Canterbury give to youth cricket. Their funding supports the Youth Super Cricket Competition and the Secondary School year 9 camps which we view as two vital programmes in the youth cricket programme.

Superstar Cricket Academies

During the 2015/16 season, 250 children were involved across Superstar Cricket Academies in Christchurch. I'd like to thank the clubs and schools for running these programmes as they are essential for first time players to develop their fundamental movement skills and cricket skills.

Kiwisport

The Kiwisport initiative, established in conjunction with Sport Canterbury, aims to introduce the fundamental cricket skills to schools across Christchurch. This programme is run as an eight week programme with cricket drills and skills completed by the children each week along with skill challenges and modified games. Eleven schools were involved with over 900 players participating during the season, with the majority of sessions being conducted by clubs, as part of their premier funding.

NZC Cup and Shield

The 2015 competitions ran extremely successfully with Christchurch teams winning both the boys and girls National competitions. Congratulations to the

Medbury boys and Heaton Intermediate girls for winning not just the Canterbury sections but successfully bringing home the goods at the National finals competitions. This is a rare achievement for Christchurch teams winning both competitions in the same year.

Superstar Cricket Trophy and Superstar Cricket League

The Superstar primary school competitions were a big hit throughout the season with over 70 teams competing across the two competitions, with 25 playing in the all-girls grade. The competitions are played on Friday afternoons. The trophy is a 10 a-side competition with a minimum of 2 girls played in term 4 and the League is an all-girls, 8 a-side competition, played in term 1. It is great to see such enthusiasm for these competitions. It was an added thrill for the teams involved was the Trophy finals day to play on Hagley Oval.

Well done to the Hillview Christian Primary team, who won the Superstar Cricket Trophy Red section. They had a team of consistent performers who complemented each other's skills well. They were also very well supported by their coach Allan Harrison.

St Albans Primary won the World Cup Action Cricket Girls competition. It was

great to see the girls thrive in a team environment and their eagerness to play cricket.

School Visits

During August and September Metro Cricket, in collaboration with the Christchurch Junior Cricket Association, undertook our pre-season promotional school visit programme. We delivered a 30 minute class coaching session to 8000 children. The sessions typically involved a warm up activity, and an introduction to a skill and a game. The visits were carried out by our Summer Squad of coaches which included three interns from the Christchurch College of Education. The visit's main objective is to promote the local cricket clubs and their upcoming registration days.

I would like to extend a big thanks to all the coaches, managers, administrators, and umpires for their hard work throughout the season. Without you, cricket simply wouldn't happen. It is sometimes an unacknowledged job you do but I know everyone, especially the players, appreciate your time in making their cricketing experience an enjoyable one.

INTO THE RETIREMENT PADDOCK

CRAN BULL

Here is a man who has served cricket in Christchurch, Canterbury and New Zealand for more than 45 years.



The inevitable occurred at the most recent AGM of Canterbury Cricket when Cran Bull was made a Life Member; this was widely acclaimed as there could be no more deserving person.

Like so many of our top cricketers, his playing career started at Christchurch Boys' High School where he played in the 1st XI for three years, the last of which he captained a star-studded team that included the much-feared bowling trio of Dayle Hadlee, Dave Trist and Alan Hounsell. Throw in Robert Anderson, Graeme Henry, Vance Bishop, Ken Baker, John Christiansen and you had something special.

On leaving school, Cran played for the High School Old Boys' Cricket Club; he progressed through Canterbury Brabin (Under 20) and Rothman's (Under 23) teams and was to captain the New Zealand Rothman's team. He had a long first class career which started in 1965-66 and continued, with some interruptions, to 1983-84. During that time Cran played 60 matches and, from 1973-74 to 1981-82, 20 List A games. He also toured some exotic cricket areas, including the West Indies, USA and South America, with the New Zealand Ambassadors team in 1970.

He was an attractive, compact right hand batsman who scored one first class hundred and six half centuries. He initially opened for Canterbury but was to move down the order to 4 or 5 later in his career.

However, despite being a very good player with a fine cricketing mind, it was in cricket administration that Cran made his mark. He served on the Canterbury Cricket Association for three years in

the early 1970s. He was elected to the Board of New Zealand Cricket in 1984 and served on it until 1995. He was the Deputy Chairman in 1994-95. He was the manager of the New Zealand team in 1987 which took in the World Cup in India.

He was to return to the governance of Canterbury Cricket as a Board member in 2001. He became its Chairman in 2006 and retired from that position in 2015. It was during these tumultuous times that Cran's attributes of wisdom, experience, calmness, prudence and common sense were put to the test.

The Board overcame some rocky financial times in the early 2000s while, at the same time, the Board continued to search for a home ground that would house their first class team and bring international Test cricket back to Christchurch which was New Zealand's traditional home of cricket.

After several grounds were discussed and discarded, Hagley Oval became an option with the support of the mayor of the time, Bob Parker. With the energy of CEO, Lee Germon and the vision of Cran Bull's Board, Canterbury Cricket set about making this dream a reality. There was much grass roots cricket support for this venue but a small and noisy minority and a cautious City Council made for difficult times. After an Environmental Court case paved the way for this build, with conditions, Hagley Oval as an international ground became a reality. In its short life, Christchurch cricket lovers have witnessed some marvellous cricket including a World Cup, enthralling Test cricket and one day internationals.

Hagley Oval is one of the world's most attractive cricket grounds of its type and Cran Bull and his team, who had to endure so much during those early years, will be remembered for their vision and their steely resolve in providing Christchurch with an outstanding venue at such an important time in the earthquake-ravaged lives of the citizens of Christchurch.

Another feature of the Bull Years was the full transition to professional cricket with the emergence of the Canterbury Wizards, the Kings, and a return to tradition by re-naming the first class team as Canterbury.

What has changed? Cran believes that the current players have much better playing facilities with superb outfields and high-quality pitches available at most first class venues throughout New Zealand. With the advent of one-day cricket in the early 1970s, this format has seen the very athletic player emerge. This athleticism has seen players now seeking to score all around the ground and this is complemented by improved equipment. However, the "cricket tragic" in Cran makes Test cricket his first love.

Counter to these improvements, he sees a deterioration in player behaviour and cricket is not well-served by this. He thoroughly approves of the New Zealand team's embracing the game's etiquette and a policy of playing without fear. In short, Cran believes the game is in good heart.

Despite his retirement from a life of service to cricket in Christchurch, he will, no doubt, be found in the Hadlee Pavilion on match days if not playing the fairways of the Shirley Golf Links.

ASHLEY TAGGART

Ashley has served Christchurch cricket outstandingly well. He will now focus on Canterbury Cricket Board matters where his knowledge of club cricket will continue to allow grass roots cricket to be well-represented.

With the recent change in the constitution of Canterbury Cricket, no Canterbury Cricket Board member can also be a Chairman of his District. As a consequence, Ashley was required to stand-down as Chairman of the Christchurch Metro Association and will be resigning from the Board at the coming AGM.

Despite his young years, Ashley has left his mark on the local cricket scene.

It started as a five year old with the Burnside West University club where he came under the coaching influence of Bruce Reid. He played for the Riccarton High School 1st XI for four years and he captained it for the last two.

On leaving secondary school, Ashley initially played for Marist before returning to the club of his youth where he played for the remainder of his playing career. He played over 100 senior matches as an all-rounder and he still holds the second fastest 50 (off 19 balls) in one-day history. Ashley was an active member from 1998 to 2011 when a back injury brought his club career to an end.

Ashley's work in cricket off the field rivals his playing days. He was on the club committee from 1999 until 2012

where he served as Club Captain and committeeman. During that time he also served on the Club Cricket Advisory Group to Canterbury Cricket. In 2012 he was voted to the inaugural Board for Metro Cricket and followed Kerry Dellaca as its Chairman after 2014. He brought a style of colour, good sense, a breadth of thought and inclusion to the position.

During his time in that position he has built on the early Metro pillars of financial stability, the continuing unity of all Metro clubs and brand awareness. He has been particularly keen to support the new initiatives that the Development area has put in place over the last season or two.

Ashley's work and family commitments are very much to the fore but he is fashioning a new sporting life in Coast to Coast and now half marathons at Wanaka.

In his short administrative career in cricket, Ashley has served Christchurch cricket outstandingly well for one so young. He will now focus on Canterbury Cricket Board matters where his knowledge of club cricket will continue to allow grass roots cricket to be well-represented.



NEV LYONS

Nev has made an indelible mark in the coaching ranks of Christchurch club cricket.

Young Nev grew up in Dunedin and played his cricket at the Albion Cricket Club alongside such players as Glen Turner and Martin Snedden. Once qualified as an electrician, Nev moved into the rag trade and moved to Christchurch where he joined the Sydenham CC as a batsman and played for both Seniors and 2A. Towards the end of his playing career he was a stalwart in the Presidents Grade.

In these more recent times, Nev has made an indelible mark in the coaching ranks of Christchurch club cricket. Like many a parent, Nev coached his son (DJ)'s team at Banks Avenue School and then East Christchurch Shirley. He was on the CJCA and was influenced by White Fern, Katrina Withers who encouraged Nev to sit his Level 1 qualification. Under the beady eye of Bill Duncan, that great East Shirley influence, Nev continued his coaching which saw him involved at the Under 15, 17 and 19 level of Christchurch Regional teams and as a Canterbury selector at these levels. He was also coach of three Canterbury Kiwi teams to Australia. Running parallel to this was his coaching at the East Shirley CC and in particular their Premier team. His record is exceptional and coincided with a golden period for the club for this was the time of Nathan Astle, Craig McMillan, Carl Anderson, Michael and Tim Papps, Ryan Burson and Scott and Jason Pawson.

Nev coached this team from 2003/04 to 2015/16 and during this era the team finished no further back than 4th in 11 of the 13 seasons in the two-day format; no further back than 4th in 12 of the 13 seasons in the one-day format; and no further back than 3rd in five of the six seasons of Twenty20 format. In all those formats, the team won eight titles. Further, East Shirley represented Canterbury at the National One-Day

Championship on five occasions to claim two 1sts, one 2nd and two 3rds.

Brilliant stats; a club coaching record unrivalled, I suspect. Behind this record is an excellent man-manager as well as having an eye for technical detail. There is no doubting that he worked with a wealth of talent but wielding this talent into a team was the secret to the success at Burwood Park. Nev ensured that the apprenticeship was served in 2A and he would introduce the young club player when Canterbury rep duty called on the more senior team members.

Nev's caring and passionate approach is being directed into overseeing the establishment of an academy within the club in the coming season to ensure that his coaching legacy will continue.

In addition to coaching, Nev has served for more than 20 years on the club committee. When not involved in cricket Nev can be found at the Kaiapoi Golf Club where he has been Secretary/Manager since 1999.

MICHAEL DAVIDSON

Michael was Club Player of the Year in the 2013-14 season after which he set up home in the Marshlands area of Christchurch and had that one very enjoyable season with East Shirley.

Michael Davidson was always a fine cricketer with this talent showing through when at Medbury School and beyond. He had three years in the Christ's College 1st XI (1997-99) with Canterbury representation at Under 14 and Under 19 level.

On leaving school, Michael followed in his brother's footsteps (Jonathon) to the St Albans Cricket Club. After a brief spell in their Seconds team, he played Premiers in the 2000-01 season until he moved clubs at the end of the 2013-14 season to East Christchurch Shirley. While he played his last season at East Shirley, it was with St Albans that he fashioned such an impressive club record.

Michael played 104 two-day matches and 113 one-day matches. He was a highly skilful left arm swing bowler and was something of a throw-back to a former era in the arts of swing bowling; he had that uncanny knack of being able to swing the ball both ways. In total, Michael took 280 wickets in the two-day format which included 11 "five fors" and one ten wicket match bag. His best bowling was 9-58. In the one-day format he took 134 wickets.

As a batsman he scored 1714 runs including one century and six fifties while in the two-day format he scored 2379 runs including three centuries and six fifties.

Impressive! He was a highly skilful bowler who had variations of pace and swing and, coupled with an aggressive approach with plenty of advice to batsman and umpire, he thrived in the



battle. He was a genuine all-rounder who was extremely dangerous as a middle order batsman. A flat-track bully would not do him justice for he could apply himself when the cause required. However, he had the capacity to take a bowler apart with a combination of brutality and attractive stroke play.

His time with the Canterbury first class team was all too brief. He played 11 times for Canterbury from 2006-07 to 2008-09. In those matches he scored one fifty and took 31 wickets with a best performance of 5-39. He also played one List A match and seven Twenty20 matches for Canterbury during that period.

Significant influences on Michael's career included Kit Perera, his Sri Lankan school coach and Dave Nosworthy, his Canterbury coach.

But it is at club level that he will best be remembered. His considerable success was interwoven with skill and durability and he played in a marvellous club era at St Albans when they won numerous Premier trophies in all formats for a dozen seasons or so. Stable selections and playing alongside such fine players as Aaron Johnstone, Chris Martin, Steve Cunis and Chris Harris contributed to the club's success.

Michael was Club Player of the Year in the 2013-14 season after which he set up home in the Marshlands area of Christchurch and had that one very enjoyable season with East Shirley. He embraced a fine club culture and being able to help a number of promising young players that were emerging in their ranks.

ALEX REESE

Alex Reese has packed a lot into his short cricketing life. And, now, he's off overseas.

Alex already has numerous stamps in his passport but this journey will see him absent for a while so it's worth reflecting what this extraordinary young man has achieved in his 24 years.

Alex emerged from Medbury School 1st XI as a very promising leg spinner and consolidated that talent when he was first selected for the Christ's College 1st XI in Year 10. He met with considerable success in that team and led it on its first, highly-successful tour to the United Kingdom in 2009. Upon leaving school, he joined the Burnside West Christchurch University CC and immediately played for the Premier side until he retired in 2013-14 from the playing side of the sport to pursue his strong interest as a coach. He took over the role of Premier coach for that side in 2013-14 until his recent departure in March 2016.

That initial taste of cricket in England saw Alex return to play in the Premier League in Kent in 2010. Following that, he spent four months in India on a cricket coaching internship at the Global Cricket School. Other roles at

this time included the cricket liaison for Ireland and the Netherlands at Pune, India in 201-11. Following that Alex was invited to run a coaching camp with Global School of Cricket for Australian Indigenous Scholars in Mumbai in 2011.

Out of these activities sprang the idea of helping impoverished young people in Sri Lanka; Alex established the Cricket Live Foundation in 2013 where there are now four centres in Sri Lanka that support over 300 young people to enhance their life skills through education in cricket. During that year, Alex was coach of The Willows CC Youth team that toured Sri Lanka and Singapore.

Following on in 2014, he organised a two-week camp for Cricket World Cup Qualifying in Scotland.

Back in New Zealand, Alex was the assistant coach to the Canterbury Under 17 team which were the champions at the National Tournament.

In the recently-completed Premier one-day competition in Christchurch, Alex worked through Metro Cricket to provide



his Cricket Live Day in one of the rounds which was a fundraiser for his cause. Hosted at Burnside Oval, it was highly popular with the club teams and looks to be a fixture in future seasons.

This popular young man will make a success of life wherever he goes and Christchurch cricket wishes him well and look forward to welcoming him back when he chooses to return.



THE SPADE WORK: GROUND RENOVATIONS AND REBUILD

Even the casual observer will have noticed that there has been massive activity in this important area of Christchurch cricket.

Metro has supplied several renovations to clubs and schools in late March and the excellent weather conditions, with timely watering, has seen luxuriant growth. With sensible pre-season preparation in September, players should benefit at the start of the season on 1 October 2016.

From January, Hospital Corner has been redesigned through a massive City Council project. Large and varying machinery have been darting about this area excavating old soil and turf, building and sowing new pitches, sowing sand-slit outfield, with a variety of seed while installing a new irrigation system.

The project has seen the six grass pitches replaced with three Waikari clay blocks laid with three artificial pitches adjacent to the grass block. As well, the entire outfield will be sand-based to provide first-class drainage conditions; a far cry from the often-flooded area in past winters. The fourth grass block (where the old Hagley Sports Centre pitch was) has been laid in Kakanui clay to replicate the Oval. In addition, the Polo Grounds have six new artificial pitches built.

The net result will be a quality cricket venue which will provide for top-level club cricket and age-group representative matches. Come the 2016-17 season, club cricket will provide a great view in the Hagley surrounds of the Oval.

CCUSA REPORT

I am pleased to present this report in my capacity as president of the Canterbury Cricket Umpires & Scorers Association.

When I assumed the presidency last October, I was determined to focus on several critical issues:

1. Increase the number of umpires and scorers in the region
2. Upskill the current members in their knowledge of the Laws of Cricket, playing conditions and most importantly, fieldcraft
3. Develop stronger relationships with Canterbury Cricket and Metro
4. Raise the profile of our association in the cricket community.

As I reflect on where we are now in regard to these challenges, I would mark us overall as 6 out of 10. Clearly there is still much to be done, however I know that we have set a good foundation moving forward to achieve a better scorecard in the years ahead.

The greatest challenge we face is to increase our membership of accredited umpires to stand in competition matches. This is a challenge that is common across all forms of amateur sport, not just cricket and certainly it is across the whole country. Just recently we have started a major recruitment campaign that is designed to reach out to all players in the region, both male & female, seeking their interest in joining our ranks if/or when they feel their playing days are behind them but they are still keen to make a significant contribution to this great game.

All clubs have indicated their support in distributing the recruitment document to their members. Contact myself if you have not seen it or would like to discuss your interest in signing up. The recruitment and training of

scorers is another priority for us. In Tony Feely, we have a terrific advocate to assist with scorer development, just a phone call away if you would like assistance from him.

We are also approaching schools in a more coordinated approach to stimulate interest there. Likewise, we have made contact with CJC&A to make contact with their clubs, in particular the parents. As a point of interest, we have signed up 2 parents who simply brought their sons along to the level 1 course that Dallas McIlwraith runs so successfully. They got the umpiring bug and they finished the season standing in Senior A matches.

We have other strategies in the pipeline which will become evident over the winter months.

We will all be winners if we get good responses to our campaign.

Throughout the 2015/2016 season we had 22 active umpires standing in matches; not all were available every week but it was particularly satisfying after Christmas to have umpires appointed regularly to Senior A. It is a given that the status of a match is significantly enhanced when the match is controlled by official umpires and this is something that should be the norm, not the exception.

We were well represented at representative level by Eugene Sanders, Jason Wood, Kim Cotton, Matthew Hill, David Henderson so our congratulations go to them for their achievements. Eugene, in particular, had a great season; he was announced

as the Community umpire of the Year, won the Metro Umpire of the Year award in the premier competition in Christchurch and was selected to travel with the Canterbury A team to Sydney in February. Bigger and better things hopefully await him in the future. Additionally we participate in several exchange programs in other regions of New Zealand and also the Victorian Cricket Association, which are great experiences for those fortunate enough to be selected. It's all part of our umpire development.

Throughout the season, we have held several meetings with Canterbury Cricket and Metro, designed to galvanise the role that our association plays in the successful running of the various competitions. The relationship we currently enjoy is very strong and positive so that ideas can be exchanged with the common goal of improving cricket in the region. It is very pleasing to report that one of our scorers, Gail McGowan, was appointed to her 1st Test when the Australians played at Hagley.

Finally I would like to thank Metro, the clubs, the captains and the players for working with us out in the middle. We are all there to enjoy the day, and we must all be aware of our responsibilities to ensure that this happens.

Winter well and we look forward to the coming season with much enthusiasm.

PETER BURKE

Peter Burke of the Burnside West Christchurch University Cricket Club was awarded the prestigious Sir Jack Newman Award.

What gave rise to Peter achieving this significant honour in New Zealand sport?

He played cricket during his formative years at Loreto Boys' School and then at St Bede's College where he played for the 1st XI in 1976. On leaving secondary school, Peter found his way to Australia and then to England. While playing rugby during this period, he also served on the administrative side of the sport and it was this experience that would serve him well upon his return to Christchurch.

When his two young boys got involved in Saturday morning sport in 1993, like many New Zealand parents, Peter became a coach. In addition, he was invited onto the junior committee and by 1995 he was convenor of Burnside Junior cricket.

While in this position, Peter initiated what has become known as "Friday night cricket" and it is synonymous with the Burnside Club. That first season in 1997 saw 230 boys and girls participating while fathers manned the

barbeques and families enjoyed the social occasion.

Peter also introduced modified cricket on Monday nights and this initiative was later to be adopted by the Christchurch Junior Cricket Association (CJCA). In 1997-1999 he was a CJCA selector.

Peter was also a prime mover to the have the junior and senior arms of the Burnside West Christchurch University Club become one and this significant step occurred in 1998. Peter took an active role on the new committee with responsibilities in junior area and fund-raising.

Peter was elected to the presidency of the CJCA in 2002 and held that position until 2005.

He was instrumental in the Have-a-Go cricket initiative as well as overseeing the transition of pitches from grass to artificial surfaces.

After a brief spell away from these cricket activities, Peter has been Junior Convenor since 2006 and on the club committee since 2008.

His contribution to junior cricket in New Zealand was recognised in 2008 when he was awarded the New Zealand Cricket Development Award for Best Junior Initiative (for Friday Night Cricket).

In 2012, Peter became a Life Member of the Burnside West Christchurch University Cricket Club and in 2014 he was voted a Life Member of the Christchurch Junior Cricket Association.

Peter has made a powerful contribution to grassroots sport in Christchurch over the last 25 years.

LESLEY MURDOCH

In the Queen's Birthday honours for 2016, Lesley Murdoch became an Officer of the New Zealand Order of Merit (ONZM).

This was Lesley's second honour in acknowledgement of her influence and service to sport in New Zealand.



Her path to the latest honour is amazing.

This is not a person who, with considerable natural talent, had significant financial support from her parents to achieve her outstanding feats. Lesley was born into a working class family of 10 children. Her early influence was from her mother Gwitha Shankland who gave hugely to hockey, in particular, and cricket administration in Christchurch. The passion and encouragement that Lesley gained from this influence has seen Lesley pass this on to large numbers of young aspiring people throughout Christchurch. She also acknowledges the influences of Jack Harlwich, Dayle Hadlee and Bob Carter in cricket, and her uncle Russ Thomas, former Chairman of New Zealand Rugby.

Lesley attended Christchurch Girls' High School and, on leaving, joined the well-known sports store of Cromb and Merritt. She played both hockey (as a goalkeeper) and cricket (as a right-hand batsman) for Canterbury from an early age. She first played for Canterbury at the age of 19 in 1975 and continued to play, and captain, until 1991, some 78 matches later. She was selected for New Zealand in 1979 and played both Test cricket and One-day Internationals until 1990. She captained the team from 1986. During this period Lesley played in the 1981/82 World Cup in New Zealand and in 1988/89 in Perth.

At the same time she was selected for the New Zealand hockey team which included a World Cup in Canada in 1979 as well as the 1984 Olympics in Los Angeles.

During the latter part of her playing career in the 1980s, Lesley gave birth to the first two of her three children.

At the conclusion of Lesley's active participation in sport, she was appointed to being a New Zealand cricket selector in the 1990s through to winning the World Cup in 2000 in New Zealand. Over the last ten years she has given back to grassroots sport by coaching at the Riccarton Cricket Club nurturing, inspiring and building the junior section including a girls' team.

Lesley's influence permeated all levels of her sport. She served on the Boards of New Zealand Cricket and New Zealand Hockey, and is currently on the Board of Netball New Zealand. Since 2008, she has been a trustee on the New Zealand Community Trust which provides funding support to many community and sporting organisations. In 2014, Lesley was recognised by receiving an award from the International Olympic Committee for Women in Sport which acknowledges outstanding work in providing support and encouragement to women and girls at all levels of sport.

Lesley's sporting experience has led her into another area of sport

which is that of a broadcasting journalist in commentary in radio and television. Initially a part-time interest, this has developed into her becoming a professional broadcaster and commentator at international level; the 2012 and 2016 Olympics, the Commonwealth Games in 1998 and World Netball tournaments in Manchester and Melbourne are a few of the places her passion has taken her. At a local level, she can be seen and heard providing the side-line comment at all Crusaders' home matches.

Recently Lesley was inducted into the Canterbury Legends of Sport.

Hugely important to Lesley's outstanding career in these various sporting spheres has been the support of Lesley's husband, Tim who is nationally known in cricket circles in his own right! Lesley acknowledges that Tim has provided sage and sound advice and support throughout.

In chatting with Lesley, it becomes very clear that her prime focus has been to pass on to others the passion that she found in sport through her mother. From that, the associated benefits that sport provides will ensure the health and wellbeing of youngsters at whatever level they are involved at.

THE VALLEY OF PEACE CRICKET CLUB

What of this club with a strange name?

It can be found, with some difficulty, if you hug the Cashmere Hills around to Hoon Hay Valley Road where the car will veer left until it can travel no further. Opposite a sharply-rising valley wall and sitting snugly on your right is a tiny, manicured cricket ground bounded by trees. At the pavilion end, to the south, sits a log cabin changing room adjacent to a bar and score box of similar material. Uniquely, within this tiny playing arena grow a few trees, including a large walnut tree, all of which provide for some interesting local rules. Sounds are amplified whether birds, ball on bat, appeals or the bell signalling the start of the session.

This secluded setting became a cricket ground in 1928 under the auspices of the Christchurch Cinemas Cricket Club. This Cinemas Company was bought by Kerridge Odeon in 1954 so a group of club members set up The Valley of Peace Cricket Club as an incorporated society in 1955 and its life continued.

Its rich history saw many famous cricketers from overseas International touring sides, from the West Indies, England, Australia and South Africa, play at “the Valley” on the rest day of the Test which was a Sunday. However, with the busier schedules in more recent times for Test and first class cricket and Sunday play at these levels, this tradition has disappeared.

Another tradition that is no longer is the “cricket golf” that would be played, post-match, around the tiny ground deep into the late day illuminated only by the lights from the bar. Sadly, stricter application of the land’s drink-drive laws has also curtailed these convivial social times at the Valley.

But tradition, etiquette and high standards of cricketing dress and behaviour remain steadfast.

Another tradition of this ground is that no woman can set foot on it which gave rise to the club’s name. The debate goes along that line which suits the feminists but it could have equally derived its name from the seclusion and peace that abounds in the valley end.

Women were sighted at the ground in abundance at the 50th anniversary in 1978 and at significant occasions ever since. Many have been involved in the landscaping of the ground as it has increased in size towards the western hill.

Each summer Sunday is the same: the deck chairs will be set adjacent to the pavilion, umpires will adorn the white coats while the duty team sets about preparing the lunch to be spread on the trestle tables. The bell will be rung to indicate play is due to begin in this much-loved game that is cricket set in this uniquely-charming ground.



Basis of Preparation

Christchurch Metropolitan Cricket Assn Inc. ("Christchurch Metro") has elected to apply Tier 3 PBE SFR-A (NFP) Public Benefit Entity Simple Format Reporting - Accrual (Not-For-Profit) on the basis that it does not have public accountability and has total annual expenses equal to or less than \$2,000,000. All transactions in the Performance Report are reported using the accrual basis of accounting. The Performance Report is prepared under the assumption that the entity will continue to operate in the foreseeable future.

Goods and Services Tax (GST)

The entity is registered for GST. All amounts are stated exclusive of goods and services tax (GST) except for accounts payable and accounts receivable which are stated inclusive of GST.

Income Tax

Christchurch Metropolitan Cricket Association is wholly exempt from New Zealand income tax under section CW46 of the Income Tax Act 2007.

Assets

Accounts Receivables

Accounts Receivable are recognised initially at fair value and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less an allowance for any uncollectable amounts. Individual debts that are known to be uncollectable are written off in the period that they are identified.

Bank Accounts and Cash

Bank accounts and cash are short term, highly liquid investments that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of change in value.

Inventories

Inventories held for consumption in the provision of services that are not sold on a commercial basis are measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

For inventory acquired through non-exchange transactions, the cost of the inventory is its fair value at the date of acquisition. For inventory held for the distribution or consumption in providing goods and services to be distributed at no charge or for nominal charge, these are measured at cost adjusted for any loss of service potential.

Property, Plant and Equipment

Items of property, plant & equipment are measured at cost less accumulated depreciation.

Depreciation is charged on a straight line basis over the useful life of the asset, except for land which is not depreciated. Depreciation is charged at rates calculated to allocate the cost or valuation of the asset less any estimated residual value over its remaining useful life:

Revenue Recognition

Donations, fundraising and other similar revenue

Donations are recognised as revenue upon receipt.

Grant revenue includes grants given by charitable organisations, philanthropic organisations and businesses. Grant revenue is recognised when the conditions attached to the grant have been complied with. Where there are unfulfilled conditions attached to the grant, the amount relating to the unfulfilled condition is recognised as a liability (future income) and released to income as the conditions are fulfilled.

Interest Revenue

Interest revenue is recognised as it accrues, using the effective interest rate method.

Fees and Subscriptions Revenue

Revenue is recognised over the period of the membership or subscription (usually the cricket season). Amounts received in advance for memberships or subscriptions relating to future periods are recognised as a liability until such time that period covering the subscription or membership occurs.

Employee Entitlements

Liabilities for wages and salaries and annual leave are recognised in surplus or deficit during the period in which the employee provided the related services. Liabilities for the associated benefits are measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liabilities are settled.

Changes in Accounting Policies

For the year ended 31 July 2015 Christchurch Metro prepared its performance report using the New Zealand Differential Reporting standards. These have now been restated to comply with Not-For-Profit Public Benefit Entity Simple Form Reporting (Accrual Basis) standards. There has been no financial impact of the transition to PBE SFR-A (NFP). There have been certain presentational changes to the performance report and notes in accordance with the requirements of PBE SFR-A (NFP). All significant accounting policies used in the preparation of this performance report as set out below have been applied consistently to both years presented in the report.



PREMIER CLUB RECORDS

To end 2015/16 Season

Limited over cricket was first played at club level in 1969-70 when a knock-out competition, with the sponsorship of the ANZ Bank, was begun. All senior clubs played plus teams representing the Christchurch Suburban Association and each of the Districts. The winners were:

West Christchurch University (1969-70, 70-71, 71-72) and Burnside West Christchurch University (1976-77)

Riccarton (1972-73)

Old Collegians (1973-74, 74-75, 78-79)

High School Old Boys (1975-76)

Lancaster Park (1977-78)

The ANZ Bank then channelled its sponsorship into the Senior Two-

Day competition and the one-day competition fell into abeyance for the next two seasons. However, in 1981-82, while continuing to finance the major competition, the One-Day format, called the ANZ Cup, re-emerged.

For the 1983-84 season, the sponsorship changed and the one-day trophy was known as the Chancery Finance Trophy.

During the 1981-82 season the CCA instituted a new and separate limited over competition, which in the first three years was played over 55 overs. Since that time it has been played over 50 overs with the rules closely following the Domestic One Day Competition.

In the first three years the eight senior teams were divided into two pools with the winners of each pool playing off in the final. However, in the 1984-85 season the competition was extended to a full round robin with the 10 senior teams now playing each other once. This round robin has continued until today, apart from the 1988-89 season, where the competition returned to a pools format.

Up to 1987-88 the senior averages and career records combine the results from both the one and two day competitions. However, during the 1988-89 season the CCA decided to fall into line with domestic and International protocol separating averages for the 1 and 2 day competition.
