
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COORDINATOR'S COMMENTS





I arrived in Nelson at the Rutherford Hotel which is where the first part of the course takes place, the weather had deteriorated even further but the rain held off. We were met at the carpark by Kevin who directed us where to park up and instructed us to go on into the venue where we met up with the rest of the trainees and the crew from *Tasman Motorcycle Training*.

The ride for ever course starts off with Jason doing the introductions and running through how the day will proceed. In in the meantime, I was a bit preoccupied with the coffee situation, but need not have worried as coffee orders were taken. Jason had moved on and was explaining something about road positions and my mind was just starting to wonder about coffee when it turned up, yes! And it was a real good one. We finished theory instruction which was full of useful information on how you can be active in keeping yourself safe and how to be seen by other road users and how to travel along the road to give you the greatest number of options to get yourself out of trouble if the unforeseen happens. We then had a coffee break and food was available if anyone wanted brunch, it did look very nice.

We were split into two groups each of us fitted out with communications devices strapped to our helmets. This experience was a new one for me having somebody else share my helmet space - a bit weird. We rode to our practice destination at Saxton car park where Mitch was setting up the cones for the slow speed manoeuvring and braking exercise. The rain which had held off was now teeming down, perfect!! Even so it turned out to be a lot of fun even if I didn't get it completely right – it doesn't help if you can't remember what you are meant to be doing. We finished the slow speed manoeuvring and went from Saxton to NPD Richmond had lunch then back onto our bikes to Upper Moutere to practice the theory and slow speed manoeuvring in real life experience. We finished up back at NPD at 4pm. It was a super day quite a few laughs and big smiles on every body's face.

I would like to thank Jason, Kevin and Mitch from Tasman Motorcycle Training and warn you that I will be back to do my next round of training next year.

Babes on Bikes

Omakau September 9th 2023

Wednesday morning we were three leaving Nelson. Juliet on her Aprilia Scooter, Miritza on her Yamaha Stryker, and me on my trusty F3 CanAm Spyder. A little drizzle and an iffy weather forecast had a couple of us wearing our wet weather pants – prepared. We stopped in Murchison at the River Café for coffee, where Colleen joined us on her new F3 Spyder.

The ride through the Lewis to Hanmer Springs was great. Dry roads, no grit, a few potholes, and very little traffic. It is hard to know where the day goes, - we left at 10.30am and arrived at 3.30pm. Mind you, we enjoy our coffee stops.

Suzy and Maria had decided to do a Thelma and Louise in a hired 5 litre Mustang. We could hear the them coming as they pulled into our motels at Hanmer. And then there were six. We enjoyed a leisurely soak in the Hot Pools before dinner at the Monteiths Brew Bar. Back to the motels and an early night. Rain overnight, we woke to a sunny morning.

Day 2 Hanmer Springs to Geraldine 287Km

Grand ride through Rangiora and Oxford on Route 77. Windy through the Waimakariri Gorge but it settled down through the morning. The Route 72 Café Bar at Cust is an experience and well worth the visit. The place is ruled with an iron fist – not a thing out of place and don't you dare move any chairs or change seats once you have ordered! Their Eggs Kiwiana is one of the best breakfasts we've had, the coffee was good and there is much to browse. Then a beautiful ride on to Geraldine.

I noticed the Humdinger Gin Distillery Gin Tastings Open Sign on our way into town and whilst only two of us tasted, it was so good, particularly their Citrus Gin, that we both bought a bottle. Not much left at the end of the trip, lovely while it lasted! Very handy having the Mustang for those shopping moments. The Geraldine Heritage Hotel was shabby, we had to park our bikes on the street, and they didn't do meals so we ate a relaxed meal on the veranda, outside our upstairs rooms. An early night was disturbed by some inebriated young locals making noise beneath the rooms and sitting on our bikes. Miritza flew downstairs through the bar to give them a few stern words and the clear directive to "get off our bikes". There may have been more words than that!

Day 3 Geraldine to Omakau 332KM

We were a little bumfuddled on the morning departure. The team left and my dashboard message read "bad key". It took a few tries and a couple of minutes sitting before my Spyder started. I headed out of town, no sign of them – maybe I missed a plan to fuel up, so I headed back to NPD, fuelled up and found the crew waiting for me on the outskirts of town. We headed to the Fairlie Bakery for breakfast, and I discovered their pork belly pie. Perfectly baked, filled with moist tender sliced pork belly, and topped with crackling. What a cracker! The weather was good, the roads were dry and we had a great run on Highway

8, with the mustang riding point. What a glorious ride to Omarama with the usual photo stop at Lake Pukaki

Lunch stop at the Wrinkly Ram had us sitting outside in the sun watching the Christchurch contingent of Babes arrive. Around 15 of them this time.



Throughout the journey we gleaned great pleasure from the Word of the Day, extending our vocabulary, causing lots of experimental wordsmithing and lots of laughs. But we weren't there to lollygag! Glorious riding through the Lindis Pass, windy in parts, we separated a bit – Colleen & I enjoying a Spyder cruise as the others shot ahead. We had seen two cops with flashing lights, one a warning, the other chasing a driver past us, as we had pulled over to check the route. Counting our luck too soon, we headed along the side of the lake, into the Cromwell Gorge when the flashing light was for me. Colleen took a snap of my courteous encounter with the nice young cop as he ticketed me for speeding. I was quite relieved it hadn't happened earlier!

We caught up with the others who were waving at us at the turn off and cruised on to Omakau. We stayed at a lovely old Air BnB, The Modest Manor, which I highly recommend. Robes in the wardrobe for the hot spa, lovely rooms, beds and setting, great homemade granola, yoghurt, bread and spreads supplied fresh each day for breakfast.

We dined Friday night at the local café, recommended by our host, and run by a couple of French women. A nice change from pub grub, there were great salads on the menu & a full house of Babes here for the weekend. Lots of catching up, laughs and a few drinks, then we moseyed back to our AirBnB for a relaxing Spa. Ah, this is the life!

Saturday we had a leisurely morning, visiting and catching up with Babes from all over the South Island. Four of us headed off in the Mustang past Becks towards St Bathans to see the fields of flowering Snowdrops a visitor had mentioned in the café. Not quite peak timing for the flowering, but the cottage and history of the area was worth the visit.



Saturday afternoon had us all donning our costumes for the Gypsy themed night. We danced our way into the pub to the tune of Gypsies, Tramps and Thieves and then proceeded to have a dam good night. The buffet was a bit overpriced — would have between fine if it had included dessert, but it was a tasty meal. Lots of dancing and hilarity with a pair of UE booms twinned so we could pump up the volume. Babes on Bikes is a great institution — Val & Chris do a lot to organise these gatherings twice a year and it is such a good catch up with other women who ride.

Sunday Omakau to Fairlie 287km

The weather looked a bit iffy for the ride on Sunday, so we changed our plan for Methven to Fairlie. I love this part of the country, we had a great ride despite the wind.



We stopped at Three Creeks Vintage Garage Décor at Burkes Pass for a good look round. It is one of those places you always mean to stop & check out but never do. Some interesting memorabilia, very American themed – a great place to wander around and stretch your legs. We stayed at the Fairlie Hotel - simple, clean, and good food, though we were all a bit full of Fairlie Pie from the first stop on arrival. One plus of these old kiwi Hotels is the people you meet. It was a dog-friendly pub, and we met a lovely couple from Blenheim, who had just bought a church in Havelock. We all enjoyed their dog, a lovely friendly whippet.

Monday Fairlie to Kaikoura 358km

Breakfast, you guessed it – Fairlie pies, and off on Route 77 through to North Loburn to visit Julie & Bruce for a wonderful lunch. Time to say goodbye to Maria, and Colleen chose to head home via the Lewis so it was 4 of us left. Nelson was copping a heavy storm and weather warning messages were coming through. We had decided to head to Kaikoura. It was a great ride, a little damp & windy, but nothing like the Nelson weather.

We stayed at the Pier Hotel quirky old front rooms upstairs with magnificent views across the to the sea snow-capped mountains. We unwound on the veranda enjoying the views and then had one of the best fish meals I've had. Fresh Terakihi in a Parmesan crust – all four of us had same. Wonderful. the Great restaurant and the French waiter had the most divine accent.

Everyone rode home on Sunday while I headed south to Ashburton. The temps never got over 5 degrees and it rained all the way!




Really grateful I had good gear so everything was dry except one hand in my "waterproof" gloves.

Sons of Thunder

 Neil Bradford 2012 (Mainstream Publishing)

One of the joys of being the club librarian, custodian of many books is to be able pick up someone else's choice of book and share that experience. This is an anthology of books about motorcycle experiences. Bradford introduces each author with a succinct biography to establish credentials then selects a passage representative of the full book. Thus Ted Simon's "Jupitors travels" 5 pages. Lois on the Loose 9 pages.

We gain a peek of Pirsig's "Zen and the art of motorcycle maintenance" an almost unfathomable gem from 1974. One of the few books I bought outright, loving the cover of the paperback but barely comprehending the text. A philosophical ride across America, rejected by 121 publishers but going on to sell 5 million copies.

Valentino Rossi relates his racing experiences on Hondas in the early mid 2000's followed by his desertion to Yamaha in 2003. He describes the Australian Grand Prix of 2004, neck and neck racing and the attack points of his opponents. How a single passing manoeuvre becomes the supreme moment particularly on the last lap, to win.


That most interesting of unlikely men who intensely loved his motorbikes was TE Lawrence -



Lawrence of Arabia. Who can ever forget the 1962 film of the same name with its huge cast of name actors of the day and featuring Peter O'Toole. A film that

went on to win seven Oscars in 1963. His rise to fame in the Middle East war(WW1) against Turkey, a misfit, insolent, but highly educated English Officer, he successfully led Arab tribesmen in audacious raids on the Turks occupying Syria.

Living on the edge transferred into his later life when he resigned his commission in the British Army to become an ordinary aircraftsman in the RAF. Living in an isolated cottage in rural Dorset, his new passion was motorcycles. Not just one or two but an accumulation of seven, all Brough



best thing to riding'

Superiors, all named George, one for each day of the week. Really. Deciding to do his weekly shopping on a 160km circuit of central eastern England, he describes his racing dual with a RAF Bristol biplane. "At Nottingham I added sausages from my wholesaler to the bacon which I'd bought at Lincoln, so nicely sliced that each rasher meant a penny....a felt hammocked box of fifteen eggs....Sleaford's

butcher has six penn'orth of dripping ready for me. ... a hundred miles for the joy of it and picking up the best food cheapest, over half the countryside."

What an odd fellow, sounds as though he could have been a Ulyssian.

This little gem of Lawrence "The Road" takes rightful place as the first in the anthology.
