PRINCIPAL'S COMMENT

Nga mihi mahana ki a koutou katoa
(Warm greetings to you all)

We've had a busy couple of weeks at Taradale Intermediate School with the Leaders Camp and Showquest being particular highlights. Our student leaders made us very proud on their trip to Auckland earlier this week. Their willingness and ability to engage with the leaders from Northcross Intermediate, Ilminster Intermediate and Taupo Intermediate to solve problems and meet challenges was great to see.

This morning our Showquest group departed for Palmerston North where we know they will perform with distinction.

The data from our relationship survey is in and shows us that lots of our students are 'strength spotting' other students (that's where they say things like "Wow, you're good at maths") and 79.5% of our students have not been bullied in any form at school or on the way to or from school. Of the 20.5% of students who have experienced some sort of bullying 75% is infrequent and most bullying is teasing and name calling. We need to impress upon our young people the harmful impact of teasing and name calling. Lots (45%) of the bullying behaviour occurs outside of school or on line.

Respect for self, others & the environment are our school values, and bullying is a disrespectful behaviour. If things are not going well or students need to share something privately, or someone is bothering them please email ineedhelp@taradaleint.school.nz (this is confidential) or

PB4L

Cultural responsiveness is key to creating learning communities of mutual respect and inclusion.

Using a culturally responsive process within Restorative Practice can include:

- Considering how the PB4L RP process align with the cultural traditions of those involved.
- Acknowledging the tikanga/kawa of the local iwi (those with mana whenua status) and those involved in an RP conversation, circle or conference.
- Incorporating cultural and religious practices, such as mihimihi, karakia, or readings.
- Choosing an appropriate venue (for example, a marae, wharenui, church, or community centre).
- Involving significant people (such as ministers of religion, elders, kaumatua, Pasifika community leaders, sports coaches) in the preparation, participation, and follow-up phases.
- Giving all those involved a full and clear explanation of the process, the rationale behind it, and the expectations from the meeting.
- Ensuring that facilitators are able to work cross-culturally and have mana and respect in the eyes of the participants.

In a nutshell, to be culturally responsive is to listen attentively, question curiously, and presume nothing.

SIX CORE MINDFULNESS PRACTICES OF PAUSE BREATHE SMILE

Last newsletter we explored the first three of the six Core Mindfulness Practices of the Pause Breathe Smile programme. Following on, listed below are the final three practices.

4. Te Whare Tapa Wha: Increasing self-awareness and understanding of interconnectedness, using an Aotearoa-specific tool for review.
5. Mindful Eating: Learning how to bring our attention fully into the present moment and experience it directly with kindness and curiosity.
6. Gratitude: Developing “peace-inside happiness” and helping us notice things that are going well instead of fixating on what is not going so well.

SCIENCE SPECIALIST ROTATION

During our Science Specialist rotations learners have been investigating “heat transfer” through conduction, convection and radiation. We have also been exploring some simple Rongoā – Maori Medicine. Learners have been to Dolbel Reserve to identify some NZ native plants and trees that are used for simple medicines. In connection with this they experienced some biotechnology and made Kawakawa balm.

sit comfortably with her, and will offer a fresh perspective in a respectful way. She is a curious and capable learner who is organised with an enthusiastic approach to learning.

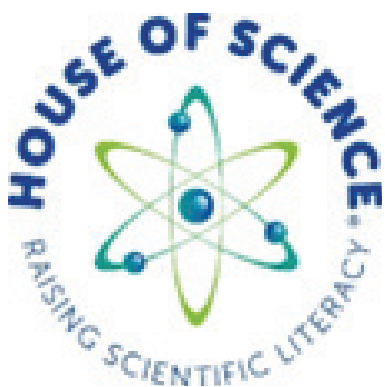
She is great at acknowledging the positive things in other people. She is honest and accurate when giving feedback to her peers, and people go away feeling good about what they have done and with something to work on.

CAPE SANCTUARY

Family Planting Day Information 2022

We would like to invite you to a family planting day at Cape Sanctuary! We are trying to get 55,000 trees in the ground this planting season, so we need your help to create our future forests!

Habitat restoration is a key part of the mahi here at the sanctuary. Native forest not only creates habitat for our endangered taonga species that we have brought back into the sanctuary, but also reduces erosion and is one of the best tools we have to fight climate change. Tree planting may be inside the predator-proof fence or be creating wildlife corridors in the buffer zones.

All ages are invited, however depending on the planting site we will be in the field planting for up to four hours so if you have limited mobility or young children please note this in your RSVP. Please check the accompanying email for the direction to the planting site, and any extra information you need to know for the day.

What to bring:

- Enclosed, grippy shoes (preferably work boots or gum-boots)
- Weather protective clothing— prep for sun or rain! i.e. a wide brimmed hat, sunblock, rainjacket, thermals, insect repellent

- Own planting spade and gardening gloves
- Own antihistamines/epipen if you have field related allergies (Bees, Wasps, grass etc)
- Own water bottle—bring a large one as planting is hard work!
- Snacks/lunch (if these are provided we will let you know)
